For this season, a lot is new. George Cockerill is the new head coach, and he has new assistants working for him supplanting some of the veteran mentors who have returned.

Cockerill, who guided the jayvees and was the varsity offensive line coach, feels the team has its strength in defense.

"We've got more starting defensive players back then anywhere else," he said. One change he has made is that there will be more players going both ways for the Pioneers, a drift away from the platoon system.

John Dannaker, who leads the team in desire and attitude, will go both ways at guard. Ed Olson does double duty at tackle, and Pat Paro is expected to punch the line at fullback and plug it from the linebacker spot. Cockerill figured they would be the only starters going both ways.

Changed Offense

The offense will change, and the defense has come under scrutiny for a new philosophy that may have opposing coaches shaking their heads at the "new" Conestoga.

In the initial scrimmage, the Pioneers bested Ches-Mont power Coatesville 20-8, and the assistant coaches insist the one Red Raider touchdown shouldn't have scored.

That would make the Pioneers quite a threat in the Central League this season and, indeed, this was the feeling of many of the members of the team last year.

Most of the defense is settled in. Frank Pitts should join Olson at tackle, and Mike Cassidy is expected to be with Dannaker at guard. Mike Machikas has been moved to linebacker but could return to defensive end. Mike DiAntonio, Rick Shirkness and Dave Tucker will also vie for starting status in the linebacker corps.

Uylous Ingram appears to have safety locked up, with **Doug Miller**, Shirkness and **Eric Redmond** in the defensive backfield.

Offensively, Cockerill looks to go with two wide receivers, and at the moment **Tom Latta** and **Mark Trudel** are the hot prospects. **Louis DeLuca**, a goodlooking sophomore, will challenge, but perhaps later in the year. The coach described Latta as having the "good speed," with Trudel the "softer touch on the catch."

Tight end will probably be **Chip Dunnuck**, with Olson and the biggest kid on the team (at 6-3 and 240 pounds), **Dave Steimke**, at tackles. **John Moller** is going to be in guard, and Cockerill lists this as one of the success stories of the new Pioneers. "John made a tremendous improvement over the summer," said Cockerill. "He was on a weight and strength program, and surprised the heck out of us. He's 100 percent improved over the year before."

Rich Syrek is a new face at tailback, and only a sophomore. Impressive **Dewitt "Buster" Howard** has been hurt, but should be available for the first game.



Pioneers Hold on to Defeat Colonials

Having everything their way for the first half, the Conestoga Pioneers had to hold the pickles and the lettuce in the second as the Plymouth-Whitemarsh Colonials came storming back to fall just short of snatching victory from the jaws of defeat, 20-15.

With two quick touchdowns and stingy defense, Conestoga shot ahead 20-0 in its half of the game, but needed some luck and a few key defensive plays in the Plymouth half to nail down its first win of the season.

It looked as if the young Pioneers were going to have a few problems with Plymouth. A first drive ended on the Colonial 28 after a mistake in the backfield. The second drive produced six points with sophomore scatback Rich Syrek going over from the 15.

Quarterback Brian Holland drew everyone on the left side of the defense to himself in what looked like a keeper play, then tossed the ball to Syrek as was going down. Syrek went in untouched.

Plymouth came back to mount its only drive of the half after two penalties gave them the ball on the Conestoga 25. On the seventh play of the drive the ball alighted on just the right pair of hands-Conestoga's Uylous Ingram.

Starting up the sideline, then crossing to the middle of the field, Ingram moved fast enough to set the grass on fire, leaving a lot of puffing Colonials behind, and completing a 99-yard touchdown trip.

Six minutes later, Holland saw something that had come up in the coaches meetings. The middle linebacker straightened up, which indicated a blitz was on. Calling an audible, he took the ball himself on a quarterback sneak from his own 35, and walked the ball in-65 yards away. With two Tom Spector kicks, the Pioneers had all they were going to get.

It wasn't a pretty game for Conestoga, and new head coach George Cockerill expressed frustration after the game. Two touchdowns had been called back: Holland's and another long run of 85 yards on a punt return by Syrek-by penalties.

All told, the Pioneers committed 13 detected miscues that resulted in 88 yards of penalties and two non-existent touchdowns.





"It is great to win," Cockerill concluded. "We will savor this as long as possible, everybody gets a passing grade (on performance) this week.





Interceptions Pace Conestoga

The Springfield Cougars had their nails clipped, teeth filed and tails tied in a 35-14 pasting suffered at the hands of the unbeaten Conestoga Pioneers on their home field Saturday afternoon.

Springfield finally got something going halfway through the third period scoring with 2:33 left in the quarter.







Holland managed 35 yards on 13 carries and was the Pioneers' leading rusher. Everybody else was ineffective against the Green Raiders' brutal defense.


TD Pass





Conestoga Crushes Royals

The Conestoga Pioneers have been having their problems putting together an offense of late but first year head coach George Cockerill made a big switch on Saturday night which paid off handsomely.

Upper Darby, which had trouble moving the ball all evening, fumbled on its next possession and Conestoga converted the miscue into a 17-0 lead as Tom Spector booted home a 30-yard field goal at the end of the first period.

The Pioneers upped it to 24-0 in the second quarter when Schofield marched his club 74 yards in 12 plays with Tom Flynn scoring from eight yards out.



Conestoga Rips Aces Behind Play of Brian Holland

As thousands of old time fans came back for Conestoga's Homecoming last night, the Pioneer football squad came into itself.

In the midst of a title drive which includes second place Penncrest next and League-leading Marple-Newtown on Thanksgiving Day, the Pioneers blew out a brilliant offensive team in Lower Merion with an awesome 40-21 performance.

"Now they believe in themselves as much as we (the coaches) have believed in them since the beginning of the season," said George Cockerill, head coach. "This has been building since the beginning. We've been getting better and better every week. Tonight was no one-shot thing."

Brian Holland, Cockerill's flashy speedster, romped for 192 yards on 22 carries, with two touchdowns. One of those came at the end of a 56-yard run. Brian also picked up 25 yards on a pass completion from quarterback Gary Schofield who "was right on the money all night long," in Cockerill's estimate.

Supporting Casts

The victory really belonged to the bruising Pioneer linemen, Chip Dunnuck at tight end, David Steimke and Ed Olson at tackles, and Mike Machikas, John Moller and Matt Paumen alternating at guards.

"They were great tonight, everybody right across the line," Cockerill said. "They were really moving people out of there making big holes that produced the big plays."

And they protected Schofield as he carved out a near perfect seven for 10 passing night. The three misses were more dropped than badly thrown.

Ironically, the game started poorly for the Pioneers as they fumbled the opening kickoff to give Lower Merion the ball on Conestoga's 26.

Conestoga kept its poise, though, marching back the subsequent kickoff from its 20 in for the score with five minutes left in the first quarter. All but one play were on the ground with running back Tom Flynn scampering the final 14 yards off left guard while most of the Aces were looking for Holland on the right side.

The kick was blocked, though, leaving the Pioneers behind.

They weren't for long, though, as the Pioneer defense rallied and stopped the Aces on the next drive, forcing them to punt from their own 41. But Pioneer defensive end Skip Lorimer, who said later he went in untouched, blocked the punt and managed to recover the ball himself on the Lower Merion 25.

Schofield then lofted a perfect pass over two Lower Merion defenders to Mark Trudel deep in the end zone to put Conestoga ahead at 3:01 left in the first quarter.

To start the second quarter, Pioneer Holland broke his 56-yard touchdown run on the second play from scrimmage to put Conestoga ahead to stay.

The Pioneers added one more touchdown before the half as Schofield fired a six-yard pass to Trudel who picked it off just above the grass and underneath a Lower Merion defender for the best catch of the evening.

The Pioneer defense shut the Aces down after that, though, allowing but two more first downs while Brian Holland, at 8:20 of the third quarter, and Flynn, with 2:04 left in the game, added the insurance scores for Conestoga.

Victory 32-0

Holland Sparks Conestoga over Penncrest

Paced by a record-setting performance by tailback Brian Holland, the Conestoga Pioneers rolled to an easy 32-0 victory over the host Penncrest Lions in a Central League contest Saturday.

Holland rushed for 214 yards on 25 carries, erasing the previous one-game Conestoga rushing mark of 206 set last season by Steve Pettia who is now at Villanova University.

Holland was well-nigh unstoppable, scoring three touchdowns enroute to the record. In fact, his totals could have been higher. A touchdown run of 37 yards by Holland in the final quarter was nullified by a holding penalty. In the second period Holland broke loose on a punt return but the officials ruled the ball had been downed on the Pioneers 44-yard line.

"Everything was working fine today," said Holland. "We ran to the left. Everyone thinks we run to the right all the time. I don't think Penncrest was ready for us."

Holland had nothing but praise for his offensive line. "The blocking up front was excellent. They were opening up tremendous holes."

At the start of the season, the talented tailback, a 6-0, 185-pound junior, was the starting quarterback. Asked about the transition Holland replied, "Last season I played both positions and I can adapt to either."

As far as preference for either position Holland said, "I like tailback because you get to run with the ball more. Of course, at quarterback you have better control of the game."

The defensive play of the Pioneers was masterful, particularly in the first half which saw the Lions limited to but one first down.

Following the game, Conestoga head coach George Cockerill was asked about the outstanding defensive players of the game. Calling over defensivecoordinator Glen Wenger, Cockerill and his assistant coach talked it over. By the time they were finished they had named every player on the defensive unit. It was the kind of game for the defense.

Penncrest, held to 139 yards total offense, mounted but one-serious threat in the game. Trailing 20-0 at half, the Lions took the field with a go-for-broke attitude.

Offense Rolls

The Pioneer offense, led by Holland with major contribution from senior Tom Flynn (53 yards on eight carries) and sophomore Rich Syrek (59 yards on four carries), moved the ball almost at will. Quarterback Gary Schofield skillfully ran the machine.

Flynn cracked over from the seven-yard line to cap a 68-yard Pioneer drive following the opening kickoff. Syrek sprinted 35 yards for the second score with 3:21 remaining in the half. Tom Spector's conversion kicks were good after each score.

With time running out in the half, Holland burst through the Lions defense for nine yards and a touchdown. Only 13 seconds showed on the scoreboard clock as Conestoga trotted off the field with a comfortable 20-0 lead.

Holland, with runs of 24 and 21 yards sparked a third period 76 yard drive, which upped the count to 26-0. His 21 yarder went for a touchdown.

In the final quarter, Holland capped a short 19-yard drive with an eight-yard scoring run to bring the final tally to 32-0.

"Last week we ran everything to the right. Today we ran wherever we wanted," said Cockerill. "We sucked their defense inside and then went outside very effectively."

Cockerill gave much credit to his offensive line. "Penncrest was doing a lot of stunting on defense but our offensive line adjusted well to it. We changed the blocking assignments and picked up the stunts. Actually the kids themselves came up with some good suggestions on changing the blocking. They've been doing this all year."

Victory 15-14

Schofield, Spector lead Conestoga

Gary Schofield and Tom Spector will remember Thanksgiving, 1977 for many a year to come.

Schofield, a 6-3 junior quarterback, drove his Conestoga High School football forces 74 yards in less then a minute, hitting Mark Trudel with a 14 yard touchdown pass to tie Marple-Newtown 14-14 with just 26 seconds to play. Spector, a 5-8 kicker, then split the uprights to give the Pioneers an almost unbelievable 15-14 victory over the previously undefeated and untied Tigers.

Marple, with 10-0 record and ranked number one in Southeastern Pennsylvania, had stormed back from a 8-0 halftime deficit with two touchdowns and held a 14-8 lead early in the final quarter. The Tigers appeared to have the victory secured when Jeff Coyne's punt rolled out on the Pioneer 26 yard line with just 1:17 left on the clock.

Schofield, with ice water in his veins and magic in his arm had other ideas. After missing his first two passes, the lanky quarterback hit Brian Holland with a toss good for 28 yards and a first down on the Tiger 44. Holland almost broke the play, but was tripped up at the last second.

Interference Call

Schofield's next toss was overthrown, but Marple was called for interference and Conestoga had a first down at the 29 with less than a minute to play.

Operating out of a shotgun formation, Schofield then hit Rich Syrek for a first down at the 14. Schofield's next toss was out of bounds to stop the clock and give the Pioneers a chance to set the big play.

With time for just one or two plays, Schofield found Trudel in the flat, Trudel took the ball, which just eluded a desperate Tiger defender and scampered into the end zone to tie the game.

With every eye in the overflow crowd on him, Spector hit the placement which gave his team the win.

Schofield, who did a fine job in handling the snaps in the short punt formation gave his line credit for their play during the final drive.

"The line was just super during the last drive," said Schofield. "They gave me the time I needed." Asked about the pressure of the time at the end, the young quarterback said that he had not watched the clock. "I knew we didn't have much time," noted Schofield. "Even on score, I wasn't thinking about the touchdown. I just saw him (Trudel) open and threw," concluded the quarterback.

Study in Contrasts

The game, played on the Tiger's muddy Harvey Field was a study in contrasts. Conestoga received the first break of the game when Pat Paro recovered Peterson's fumble on the Tiger 36.

After Holland picked up five on two bucks into the line. Conestoga was detecting holding, and the penalty put the ball back to the 49. Schofield hit Holland with his first pass completion, but the play lost two yards and the Pioneers were forced to punt.

Marple was hit with a 15 yard penalty for roughing the kicker and the play turned out to be a key one. Faced with fourth and nine from the 36, the Pioneers elected to punt again. This time Paro's kick went out on the one foot line.

After picking up a yard, the Tiger's Peterson was hit in the end zone by right side of the Conestoga line for a safety. The play gave the Pioneers a 2-0 lead at the 2:23 mark.


Touchdown Run

Conestoga quickly added insult to injury as Holland took the free kick at his 35 and raced 65 yards down the right sideline to push the lead to 8-0 at the 2:12 point on the period. A try for a two point conversion after two offside calls against Marple failed.

Conestoga's defense continued to dominate the game as the second period began. The Pioneers finally took over the ball on the Tiger 44 and drove to the Marple 15. Faced with a fourth and 15 Conestoga went for a field goal, but the kick was low and off to the left.

Cockerill also had high praise for quarterback Schofield. "Gary did a great job, he never lost his poise, and Holland came up with the great catch on the last drive. This is our greatest victory of the year. This is the way to end a season. It was high school football at its best," concluded the coach. Conestoga ended the year with a record of 8-2.
