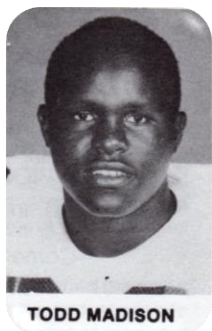

Madison leads Conestoga's 20-0 Win

With a nickname like "Bubba" and a 5 foot 11, 225-pound physique, you wouldn't expect Conestoga running back Todd Madison to blaze 99 yards like a speeding bullet.



You'd expect a battering ram, a bull who leaves defenders planted in the turf. But 99 yards? With one shot no less??

That's exactly what Madison did Saturday night as the host Pioneers blanked Pennridge 20-0 in a non-league football game. The powerful fullback turned a simple dive play in the first quarter into a record-at-any-level 99-yard touchdown that broke the Rams backs.

"It was a dive off the left side," Madison explained, who finished with 148 yards and two TD's in 11 carries. "The way their defense was playing, I just bumped it outside and when I got to the secondary, I cut to the right."

One more thing, when Madison reached his own 15, his shoe fell off. It turned into a minor inconvenience, however, as Madison chugged down the right sideline and shrugged off the final would-be tackler at the Pennridge 30.

"When my shoe fell off I started slipping," Madison said, "I wanted to break one so bad."

Shoestringer

"I just thought I'd get as much as I could. If someone caught me, I'd straight arm him and throw him off."

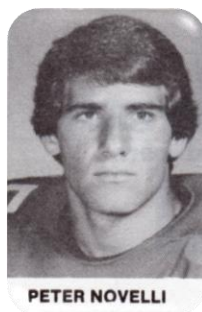
Conestoga head coach Harry Gicking couldn't believe his eyes. "That run was just remarkable," Gicking said after Conestoga improved to 2-0. "I guess for a big guy he can move pretty well."

Madison wasn't finished. He went back to his bruising style, picking up five yards at a clip and an 11-yard touchdown with 4:31 left in the game. Pennridge tried to gang-tackle Madison but it would have taken the whole Pennridge band to bring him down on most occasions.

"Five guys hit him (on the 99-yard run) but he broke the tackles. "Pennridge head coach Frank Krystyniak said after his squad fell to 1-1. "If you're on their side you say he's a great. If you're on our side you say we tackle poorly."

Madison's long TD with 3:54 left in the first quarter followed a 79-yard Pennridge drive.

The Pioneer defense recovered three fumbles, blocked a punt and intercepted two passes. Particularly active was 5 foot 9, 177-pound linebacker Peter Novelli, who picked off one pass.



"We switched Pete from defensive end to linebacker this year," Gicking said. "He's the captain, he's the leader. He pursues so well. He can find the ball, and he gets to it quickly."

One of the biggest defensive plays came on a Pennridge fourth-and-one late in the first half. Pascoe attempted his only pass of the game and didn't come close to a completion.

Conestoga drove for a TD after taking over on the Pennridge 49 as Dennis Knight (15 carries, 71 yards) scored from the three with 43 seconds left. The 14-0 halftime lead was plenty of cushion against Pennridge's ball-control offense.

steamrolled is enough to take the heart out of most teams.

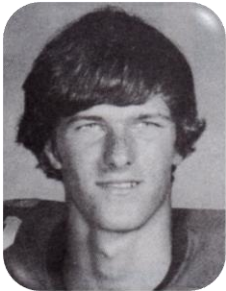
"I don't know if we were psyched out," Gicking said, "but we seemed a little different today. There's the idea that Ridley wins all of the time."

Injury Letdown

The day started going downhill on the Pioneers' first offensive series when Todd Madison separated his left shoulder. The 5-foot-11, 225-pound fullback ran for 148 yards, including a 99-yard touchdown against Pennridge, but he was relegated to the end of the bench against Ridley.

"He's been very effective," Gicking said. "He's a very talented kid. Mentally it was a letdown."

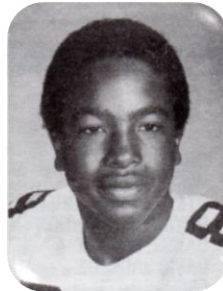
Although the tenacious Ridley defense should be credited for most of Conestoga's offensive woes, Madison's absence certainly had an effect. Without their burly fullback, the Pioneers rushed for only 87 yards.

Szafranski 78-yard Punt Return lifts Conestoga

It was a day for defense. The ground was wet and the yards were coming as grudgingly as the sunshine on a gray, misty Saturday.

With Conestoga and Springfield tied 0-0 early in the fourth quarter, it looked like the teams could play until Thanksgiving without finding the end zone. The only way to prevent a scoreless tie, it seemed, was for one squad to spring a big, out-of-character play.



Conestoga finally sprung that play, a Dave Szafranski reverse on a punt return that went 78 yards for a touchdown. The visiting Pioneers

held on for a 7-6 Central League win as the Cougars failed on a two-point conversion with 4:24 left.

The reverse breathed the first offensive life into the defensive struggle. Pioneer Dale Alleyne fielded Bob Defina's low kick near the Conestoga 20 and started toward his left. He handed the ball to Szafranski, who took off toward the right sideline.

Path Clear

The path was practically clear most of the way as soon as Szafranski turned the corner. Eric Denny



threw one crushing block. The other Springfield defenders were walled off to the inside. Szafranski broke Defina's tackle on the Springfield 45 and cruised into the end zone with 10:23 left.

"We had tried the play before, but we never got a chance to run it," said Szafranski, who started his first varsity game as quarterback. "Every time, it was either a short punt or a fair catch. It worked perfectly. Dale ran one way and gave me the ball. We had the wall set up. I said there's no way I'm going to get caught."

Denny's extra point after the touchdown turned out to be crucial - with just six minutes left.

Conestoga played without slat fullback Todd Madison who will miss four to six weeks with a separated shoulder. The Pioneer defense held Springfield to 188 yards only 72 coming on the ground. Chris Manion led the way with two sacks.

Conestoga makes UD 'Face the Music'

The performers wearing the Upper Darby uniforms moved at will. Up and down the field, precision in every movement, a real pleasure to watch. Even the partisan Conestoga fans responded with a rousing ovation.

But halftime finally ended and the Upper Darby band had to take to the stands. When the Royal musical ensemble wasn't performing last night, the Conestoga football team was orchestrating a rout. With an offense that was all crashing cymbals and big base drums and a defense that was music to coach Harry Gicking's ears, the Pioneers rolled 40-0.

"We expected a very tough game," Gicking deadpanned after the Pioneers improved to 2-1 in the Central League and 4-1 overall. "It was a combination of our kids playing well and their kids not playing as well as they would have liked."

Mostly, it was the result of an offense that had been sleeping the previous two weeks waking up with a vengeance. The Pioneer offense had scored only one touchdown since fullback Todd Madison separated his shoulder against Ridley two weeks ago, and Gicking felt it was time to do something about it.

"We looked at what we did against Springfield last week," said Gicking of a game the Pioneers won 7-6 on a punt return touchdown. "Springfield was tough inside, but maybe we should have tried different things.

"We also had some new people in there, Dave Szafranski at quarterback, Pete Novelli (for Madison) at fullback. That changed our approach. This week we

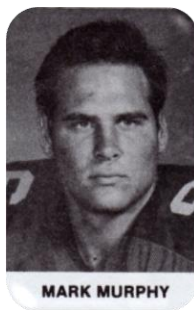
wanted to use our offensive skill people, we wanted to score some points."

It didn't take long for the Pioneers to accomplish their goal. On the first play from scrimmage, Szafranski hit a wide-open Dale Alleyne for a 56-yard touchdown pass.

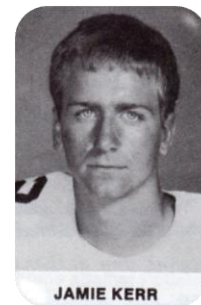
Before the night was over, the Pioneers would total 313 yards, including 263 in the first half while most of the starters played. They did it with a completely new backfield. Szafranski at quarterback, Novelli at fullback and Marvin Chavous who scored two TD's at halfback.

Szafranski showed a lot of poise for a player starting only his second game at quarterback. He rushed 8 times for 50 yards and was 4-for-8 passing for 92 yards and two TD's in about one half of play.

"He's a very poised athlete," Gicking said. "He's extra confident. He's very fluid out there."



Szafranski's favorite target was split end Mark Murphy. Szafranski hit Murphy three times for 36 yards and one TD, and Jamie Kerr found the senior receiver twice for 61 yards and one TD. Murphy is nearing a school record with 46 career catches.

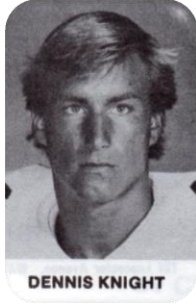

Conestoga snaps Aces' Winning Streak

Dennis Knight and Dave Szafranski were two-way stars Saturday as the visiting Conestoga Pioneers upended Lower Merion 21-11, handing the Aces their first Central League loss to pull even with them in the standings.

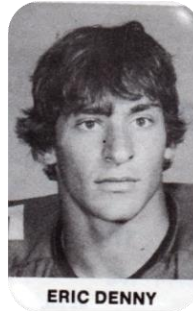
Knight's rushing and Szafranski's passing led the Pioneer offense, and both players chipped in defensively with key interceptions. In fact, Pioneer coach Harry Gicking rested quarterback Szafranski on offense in the fourth period to insure that the six-foot, 177-pound junior would be fresh for defensive chores.

"They're a physically tough team," Gicking said following the win, "and I did not want Dave too worn down. He's an excellent defensive player, and we still had a capable quarterback in Jamie Kerr.

Szafranski completed a credible seven of 12 passes and Kerr was three-for-three.

Lower Merion Scored First.

The 3-0 score stood after the first period, but Knight's rushing (62 yards) and Szafranski's passing put the Berwyn contingent on top 14-3 at halftime.



Knight scored first on a 14-yard run, then Szafranski hit Mark Murphy with a quick two-yard touchdown pass and Eric Denny booted the extra points.

Knight capped the Pioneer offensive efforts, by bulling his way over from the Aces' nine with less than 10 seconds left in the third quarter. Denny's extra point gave Conestoga a 21-3 lead heading into the fourth quarter.

Interceptions by Dale Alleyne and Knight late in the game thwarted the Lower Merion comeback and brought the Pioneers even with the Aces in the Central League standings, both are 3-1.

Gicking Upset after Conestoga Buried

He has been called it so many times, you'd think, "Mild-mannered" was Harry Gicking's first name. The Conestoga head football coach is always under control and never utters a word you can't find in a family newspaper. Your basic nice guy.

But Conestoga's performance in a 20-7 loss to Penncrest last night was so poor that even Gicking surpassed the boiling point. Four interceptions, three lost fumbles and a blocked punt returned for a touchdown led to a post-game oratory that though still fit for a family paper, peeled paint from the locker room walls.

"I thought it was time I made the kids know the way I felt," said Gicking, trying to gain control of his emotions after the Central League game. "I wanted to let them know where we have to go from here. Whatever we did tonight is over with. We just have to keep going."

The main themes of Gicking's lecture were "setting priorities" and getting "fighting mad" for next Friday night's game at home against Radnor. After last night's performance the Pioneers have plenty to be mad about.

Conestoga's Dennis Knight scored on a seven-yard run with 7:39 left in the second quarter.

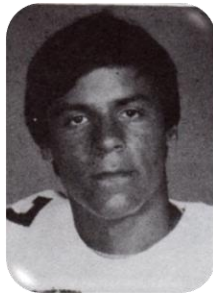
The Pioneers had reason to feel good at that point. Despite a sloppy first half, they only trailed by three, and Penncrest's best player, Lockwood, was out with a slight concussion suffered trying to tackle fullback Todd Madison.

But those good feelings evaporated with 1:10 left in the third quarter as Conestoga punter, Mark Murphy had trouble with a bad snap and had his punt blocked. Ken Fuller picked up the loose ball and rolled into the end zone to give the Lions a 17-7 lead.

"It's not as if they beat us," Gicking said. "We beat ourselves. We made errors at critical points. They were turned into points. You just can't play like that."

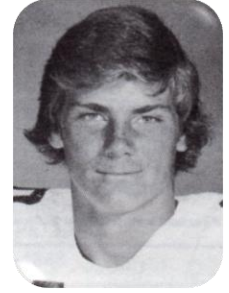

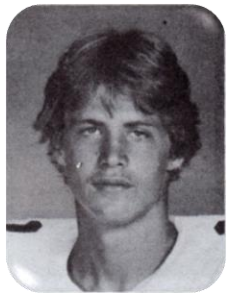

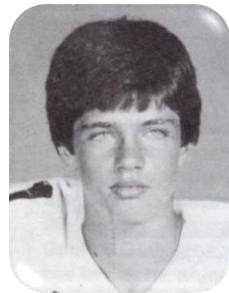

Inspired Pioneers roll over Radnor

Vince Lombardi was known for his fiery pre-and-post game oratories. Ex-Phillies manager Dallas Green berated his team into winning the only World Series in the club's history. And who can forget Knute Rockne's exhortation to win one for Ronald Reagan.

But when it comes to post-game speeches on the high school level, Conestoga football coach Harry Gicking doesn't have to take a back seat to anyone.

After a frustrating 20-7 loss to Penncrest last week, Gicking raised the decibel level in the Pioneer locker room to something approaching a sonic boom. The message obviously came through loud and clear because the inspired Pioneers crushed a normally tough Radnor squad 34-8 last night at Conestoga.

"You can never gauge what kind of effect a talk like that will have," Gicking said after the Pioneers raised their Central League record to 4-3 and overall mark to 6-3. "It comes down to the kids and what they want to do. The kids really came to play tonight." Gicking's speech got the Pioneers going in the right direction after they dropped two straight league games. He talked (loudly) about setting priorities and then followed it up with a tough, tough week on the practice field.

The Pioneers would give 100 percent against arch-rival Radnor was apparent from the opening whistle. Conestoga controlled the entire first quarter, driving from its 36 to the Radnor 14 on the opening

series and from the Conestoga 46 to the Red Raider seven on another.

The bottom line, however, was that the game remained scoreless as Conestoga kicker Eric Denny missed a pair of field goals.

But the Pioneers remedied the situation quickly in the second period. Dave Szafranski (8-for-15, 102 yards) hit split end Mark Murphy for a 21-yard touchdown at the right corner of the end zone to give Conestoga a 6-0 lead. Murphy now holds the Pioneer record for career TD catches (11), receptions (56) and yardage (over 700).

It took four more plays for the Pioneers to up the lead to 12-0 as Szafranski and Dale Alleyne teamed on a reverse on a Tim Connor punt. Szafranski fielded the punt, headed to his right and handed to Alleyne at the Conestoga 30. Alleyne found open spaces down the left sideline. He juked around a Red Raider defender at the Radnor 25 and picked up a crushing block from Dennis Knight before steaming into the end zone. Murphy caught Jamie Kerr's two-point conversion pass and the Pioneers were rolling.

Todd Madison's 11-yard touchdown run made it 21-0 at the half. Knight and Szafranski added short TD bursts in the third quarter before Connor scored from five yards out with 2:16 left in the game to avert a shutout.

"Defensively, we tried to stop their inside running game," Gicking said, "we pinched everyone. The guys on defense--Mike Sweeney, Dave Outhous, Tom Alleva, Chris Mannion, Jamie Nudy, Craig Young, Peter Novelli--they all played a great game."

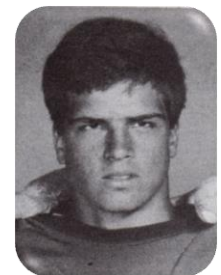

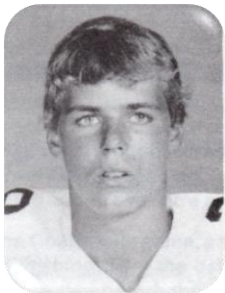

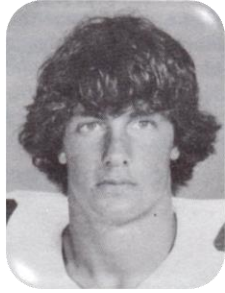
"I kind of feared this would happen after the big game we had last week. We didn't play anywhere near like we played against Radnor."

"They played us really tough," Gicking said. "They were beating us off the ball--that was the key. They played solid football and their defensive line was tough, no questions about it."

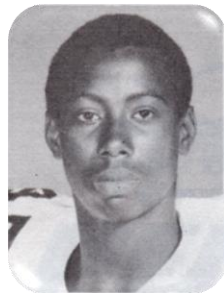
