Pioneers Hurt by Graduation

Daily Local News Football Preview

September 21, 1972

Undeniably hard hit by graduation, Conestoga may be hard pressed to equal last year's second-place finish in the tough Central League. The Pioneers of '71 went 7-3 on the year but some 14 starters went elsewhere when the year was over.

Conestoga's traditionally strong defense limited opponents to a ludicrous average of 3.2 points per game. Indeed six of its seven victories were shutouts, including two over league powers Ridley (19-0) and Haverford (18-0). But, eight defensive first liners are gone, most noticeably tackle Steve Schlindler and end Tim Gesner.

Things are no brighter for the offense as its entire interior line is gone, a line which was spearheaded by right guard Schlindler, who gained All-League honors both on defense and offense.

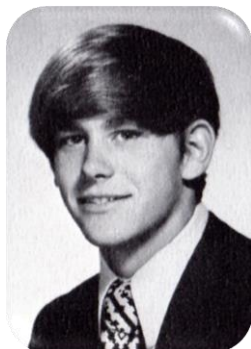
"We're trying to get a more balanced offense this year," Paolantonio said. "We need to get a more balanced offense so we'll be going to the air more."

"Chuck Myers has been throwing real well. We've been trying to roll him a little to open up the offense."

Myers (6'1, 170) returns for his third season as starting quarterback with a couple of mates from last year. One is Dave Geter, a fullback who goes 5-7, 175. Though small by running back standards. Geter's being named to the All-League's second team shows what kind of back he is.

Also returning is Byron (*Bitie*) Williams a speedy 5-10, 155-pounder flanker. He throws nearly as well as he catches and also runs the flanker-around well enough to make things a little easier for offensive coach Harry Golden.

Two others, at least, also should be seeing some passes this season, returning ends Bernie Driscoll and Louis Alleva. Both are fast while Alleva has exceptional pair of hands.

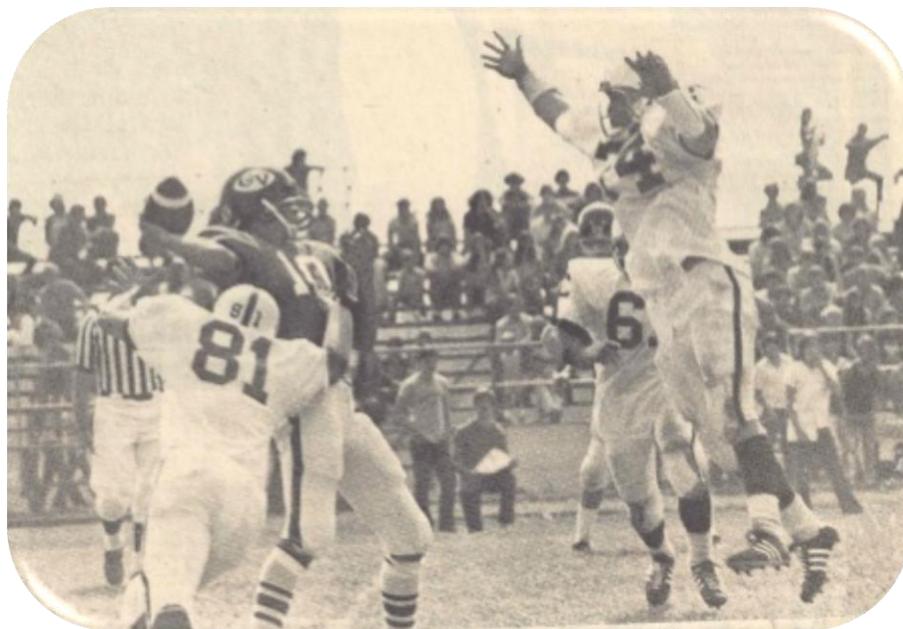

Defense has usually played no small parts in Conestoga's football programs and this year should be no exception. Clarence Culpepper, largely responsible for molding last year's strong defense, has left to become Defensive Coordinator at Great Valley.

The Pioneers go with an Even-Front defense, one which pits six linemen and only two linebackers against opposing offenses. The defense tentatively plans to have Bill Hahn (6-0, 180) and Bob Chamness at ends. Eric Swanson (5-10, 185) and sophomore Dave Vegso at tackles and Euclid Noble (5-7, 175) and George Hahn (5-9, 150) at guards. Swanson and Noble are the only ones with much varsity experience but last year's defensive end, Rich Whiting (5-11, 165) is still around.

The linebacking positions are set with captain Chris Staley (5-10, 170) and John Ames (5-11, 185). Staley was a starter all year while Ames moved into the lineup late in the season during his sophomore year at Conestoga.

One of last year's cornerback, Mike King (5-8, 175) moves over to the safety spot this time around while Dave Scanlan and Chris Annas (5-8, 160) take over the two cornerback spots.

Halt Radnor Rally

Pioneers Take 20-15 Win

The Conestoga Pioneers survived a late-minute flurry of activity by the Radnor Raiders in gaining their second win of the season, 20-15, at Teamer Field in Berwyn Saturday afternoon.

Admittedly, Conestoga has two well-advertised offensive threats in the legs of Dave Geter and the arms of Chuck Myers, but the Pioneers found the punt their best weapon in the first half as they jumped to a 12-0 lead over the winless and outgunned Radnor team.

Conestoga cashed in first with 50 seconds left in the first period when Geter bored through from the one yard line, capping a 53 yard march in which Geter gained 25 yards himself. The 5-8 senior back gained a total of 92 yards in 19 carries through the afternoon, keeping the Radnor cornerbacks honest with outside slashes.

Radnor got the ball to the 30 when a mix up in the backfield dropped the ball into the hands of a Conestoga line-man.

Five plays later, the Pioneers razzle-dazzled with a halfback option pass. By Williams threw to another

back, Keith Williams and Williams got the ball in a crowded end zone when everybody else missed. 12-0 Conestoga with a little more than two minutes left.

Radnor drew first blood with but three minutes gone in the third period.

Conestoga came back as far as the Radnor 32, when a neat Myers pass hit right end Louie Alleva dead center in the numerals, but Alleva dropped the ball and the Conestoga drive stalled.

A Radnor pass was intercepted on the Raider 33 by Dave Scanlon and the Pioneers moved to the Radnor 11 before 30 yards in penalties forced the drive out of range.

In the midst of the last quarter, Conestoga started a march on its own 48, with Myers able to open up the passing game a bit, throwing to Alleva and Bernie Driscoll for 33 yards. Alleva's reception brought the ball into scoring distance on the eight and Driscoll scored three plays later on a swing pass from Myers. A pass from Myers to By Williams put two extra points on the scoreboard for Conestoga.

The win puts the unbeaten Pioneers one up in the Central League and two wins for the year.

Bob Smith of Conestoga had 61 yards in 18 carries.

Late score tops Penncrest

Pioneer Rally Wins 14-8

Quarterback Chuck Myers filled the air with footballs when the heavy Conestoga ground game couldn't get unstuck in the mud, pacing the unbeaten Pioneers to a 14-8 win over a spunky Penncrest team Saturday afternoon in Paoli.

Myers uncranked a Pioneer passing attack that saw him complete 10 throws for 166 yards.

Senior ends Louie Alleva and Bernie Driscoll provided nine of the receptions, with Alleva extending the offense for 65 yards. Driscoll for three catches and 67 yards.

After a first half of slipping and sliding; Conestoga managed the first score with Byron Williams snaring a 32-yard pass from Myers. His catch capped a 63-yard, 10-play drive which set the tone for the remainder of the half as Conestoga was to run nearly twice as many plays as the Penncrest Lions.

Conestoga had been forced deep into its own territory after the Lions had punted to the Pioneer five. On third down, Ricky Groves tried to get the Conestogans out of trouble, but could get the ball only 20 yards down field on a kick into the wind.

Conestoga then got stalled on the Penncrest 18 after Driscoll had set the Pioneers up with a nice 25-yard return of the Penncrest kickoff to the Lions' 44.

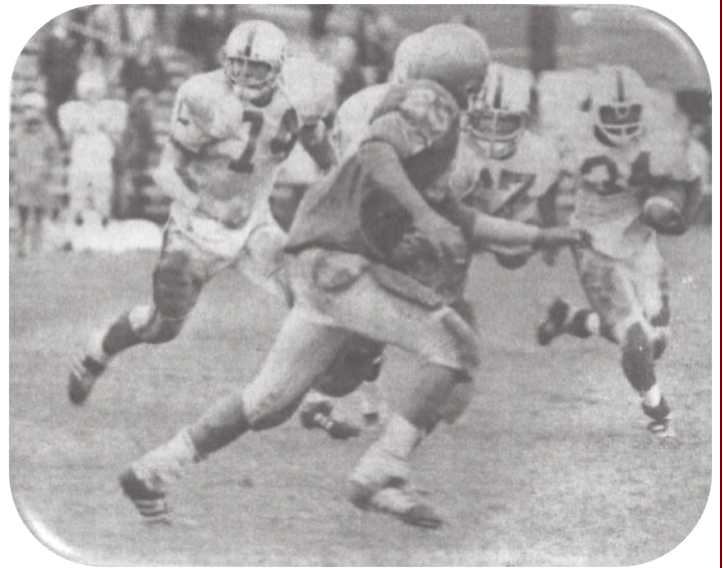
Penncrest couldn't do much better and the Pioneers got the ball back seven plays later Myers threw four passes in the next eight plays, but Conestoga could only bring the ball to the Penncrest 31, where the ball went over on downs.

Penncrest bobbled the ball again in the backfield, but this time Conestoga junior defensive back John Ames wrapped up the fumble.

Myers threw to Driscoll for two key passes, ran for a first down, and Dave Geter punched regular holes in

the Penncrest line as the Pioneers were able to move to their final score.

Geter, who had been banged around once on a run around left end to the Penncrest four, came back into the game to score from the one and Keith Williams second point-after kick put Conestoga up, 14-8.

After piling up 92 yards against Radnor last week, Geter found that there was usually someone waiting for him in the Penncrest defense, and was held to 65 yards in 22 carries. Still, when the going got roughest, it was Geter's 5-8, 180-pound frame that was usually crashing into the line.

Bob Smith, who gained 61 yards by the Lions, doing most of his running from cross-flow handoffs against the grain of the blocking as the Lion line kept holding.

Coach Puzzled after Pioneer Deadlock

A toothless Conestoga offense met its match Saturday afternoon in Paoli during a Central League Standoff with Ridley's Green Raiders. 0-0

Head coach Bill Paolantonio was puzzled after the game, not so much at the score, but what had happened to his running backs.

In the early going, Dave Geter, Conestoga's top ball carrier who was to rush for 41 yards in 15 carries, was the object of defensive keying by the Ridley defense.

The Pioneers took the opening kickoff and marched to the Raider 14-yard line in 16 plays. Tony Geter, the young sophomore starting his first game in the backfield after running back the kickoff of last week's game against Marple Newtown was used extensively.

Tough Defense

With fourth down on the Raider 14 and four yards needed for the first down. Byron "Bitie" Williams got the call on a sweep around left end. But this is where the first outstanding defensive play of the game came in.

Conestoga was to give up the ball on the Ridley 12 and wasn't to spend any more time in the vicinity until the waning moments of the first half when Dave Geter left the ball on the 14 after an 11-yard run.

Ridley Threatens

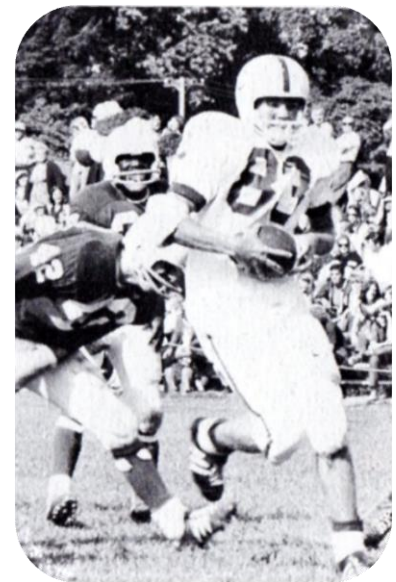

Offense Improves

Conestoga rips LM 40-0

Last week the Conestoga football team couldn't buy an offense.

On Saturday morning at Lower Merion, the Pioneers couldn't turn it off as they plowed the Bulldogs into the frosty sod, 40-0.

Before game time the Conestoga coaching staff was wondering just how effective the elusive offense could be without Dave Geter, the fireplug running back sidelined with the flu, and Byron "Bitie" Williams, a halfback suffering from a muscle pull.

But it was hard to tell that they were missing as Tony Geter, a sophomore playing in his second varsity game as a starter subbed for his brother, and Kevin Williams took over for Bitie.

Williams was to go on for 96 yards in six carries, and quarterback Chuck Myers threw five completions in five tries for 74 yards as they led the transcendent Pioneer offense to 232 total yards in the first half.

Myers was to score two touchdowns himself and throw for another while Williams found a weakness in the left side of the Lower Merion line for two more scores and also kicked two points after.

Conestoga got things underway when the opening Bulldog kickoff went out of bounds on the Pioneer 41. Myers pushed the team for 59 yards in seven plays, tossing a six-yard pass to sticky-fingered Louie Alleva for the touchdown.

Lower Merion bobbled the Conestoga kickoff, and captain Chris Staley landed on the ball at the Bulldog 34. Six plays later Myers took the ball over himself

from the seven, throwing to Alleva again for the extra points, and the Pioneers had already capped the game.

Myers opened the second quarter by giving the ball to Williams on a reverse that should have scored the third touchdown, but a downfield blocker forced a Bulldog defender into the streaking Williams. Keith picked up 17 yards on the play, anyhow, and set up the score on the next series.

Again Myers went to the air and threw for six points to left end Bernie Driscoll, but the play was called back. Two plays later Myers took it over for sure himself, and Conestoga was ahead 21-0 after Williams added the extra point on a kick.

Conestoga moved downfield in three plays, aided by another 15-yard penalty, a 22-yard Myers to Alleva aerial, and Williams 13-yard jaunt around right end for the touchdown.

Kadison started the next Bulldog series from his own 16 after another penalty, and just wriggled free of the end zone on first down when Eric Swanson and Staley nailed him trying to pass. Conestoga got the ball on the L-M 27 after the punt. Myers ran for 21 yards and Tony Geter punched over from six for the score.

Williams added the extra point, then the last touchdown of the game with a minute and a half left on the 23-yard run around, you guessed it, right end.

Brightest spot in the second half was the running of sophomore Ricky Groves, who picked up 45 yards in seven carries to emerge as the second best rushing back of the morning for Conestoga. Defense by juniors Rich Duffy and Jeff Jackson and sophomore Greg Marquardt indicates that the Pioneers will have some strength next year.

Pioneers Capture Central Upset with 20-6 Win over Springfield

In a completely one-sided game, Conestoga used ball control and field position to keep Springfield from scoring, and shut out the most dangerous part of the Cougar attack, the quarterback bootleg option.

Only once in the entire game did Smith have the time to throw the bomb, and he showed his stuff with a 73-yard alley-ooper that sailed 50 yards in the air to Wayne Smith.

But for the remainder of the game, Smith was dodging Dave Vegso, Bill and George Hahn, Chris Staley and Euclid Noble.

On the other half of the field, Smith's counterpart, Chuck Myers, was leading the Conestogans to their biggest win of the year and a possible long shot at the lead in the Central League.

Myers carried the ball 26 times for a total of 126 yards, and passed for 90 more yards as Conestoga maintained control of the ball for three-quarters of the game, including 19 out of 24 minutes in the last two periods.

A relentless ground game paced the Pioneers as Dave Geter rushed for 49 yards in 16 carries, and younger brother Tony, a sophomore, piled up 83 yards in 15 carries.

Conestoga drew first blood after 47 seconds of the second quarter had gone by, with Myers testing the left side of the Cougar line for 25 yards. Caught in a pocket at about the 15, Myers got a two-man block from end Bernie Driscoll to spring him the last yards.

Dave Geter scored next, bulldozing across from the four with a little more than four minutes left in the half. Geter, at 5-8, is so small that as he plunged into

the line, spectators were marking his progress by the Springfield players getting stood up and run over in the pileup.

The Cougars came right back after Geter's score and Keith Williams' second point-after, as Smith hit Smith for the only marker in the game for the Cougars.

The second and longest (five plays) Cougar drive, in the last quarter, was arrested when Reggie Williams made an olympic interception on his own seven yard line to take a sure touchdown away from intended receiver Mike Mackrides.

Long Drive

Then a remarkable thing happened.

Conestoga put together a 22 play drive that took up nearly nine minutes of the fourth period. Up front on the offensive line, blockers Steve Shultis, Euclid Noble and Eric Swanson were lining 'em up and knocking 'em down like the Earp brothers at the O.K. corral.

Getting the ball down to the one-foot line, the Pioneers finally called time with 13 seconds remaining in the game. On the next play, Geter again waded through the Cougars for another six, his second touchdown of the day against a previously unbeaten team.

Paolantonio has praise for everybody, especially Myers.

He had praise for his up-front blocking: "You saw that last drive...they just blew them right out of there," and Myers' ability to find the weakness in the Springfield defense: "They were giving us a hole in their five-three defense on the right and on the left...he found it."

Pioneers Toy with Haverford 45-20 as Dave Geter Scores Three in Win

Dave Geter scored three touchdowns in the first half and rushed for 126 yards as the league-leading Conestoga Pioneers toyed with Haverford, 45-20.

Pioneers unexpectedly found themselves at the top of the confusing Central league heap when Radnor downed unbeaten Marple-Newtown, and Springfield managed a 0-0 tie against Ridley, the third team (including Conestoga) to do that this season.

With a 6-1-1 record on the season, and a 5-1-1 in league play, Conestoga now has 11 points over all.

Conestoga didn't get untracked from some sloppy play until late in the first quarter as Haverford did look ready for about eight minutes. After Dave Vegso's recovery of a Ford fumble. Conestoga started a drive on its own 38. Geter carried the ball five times for a total of 33 yards, and Bernie Driscoll caught two Chuck

Myers' passes for 23 more yards as the Pioneers moved upfield for the first score of the game with just 26 seconds left in the quarter.

Another fumble and another Conestoga drive put Geter across from the one, with the senior half back's longest gain a 21-yarder dragging one safety for five yards before he could be brought down.

Geter Again

Haverford was getting stuck fast now, and after a Ford punt the Pioneers came roaring back for the third score in less than 10 minutes with Geter doing it to them again, this time on a 33-yard jaunt that left that same hanger on safety from Haverford in the mud at the 14.

Conestoga scored again on the first drive after the Haverford kickoff, and the game turned into a rout. This time Kevin Williams got a measure of revenge. On the previous play Williams had set up the score with a 43-yard slash that was stopped short of the goal by little more than a foot.

Conestoga kicked off, and Haverford's quarterback Paul Girone obligingly fumbled on the first down, with Conestoga picking up the ball on the Fords' 19 yard line. Williams did his thing on the next down, and the score was 32-0, with more than nine minutes left in the third period.

Haverford still couldn't get untracked, and Myers took the ball over from the 11 after he had thrown a 44-yard aerial to Driscoll and a 17-yarder to Louie Alleva to sustain a 72-yard, four-play drive...39-0.

Eric Swanson at tackle played an outstanding defensive game...both Bernie Driscoll and Louie Alleva made three receptions during the afternoon. Alleva for 70 yards, Driscoll for 67.

Keith Williams ended up with 67 yards in four carries, and showed some outstanding speed in the process.

Pioneers Take 33-13 Win from Darby

Royals in 'Battle of Coral Sea'

World War II, the Conestoga Pioneers, laying claim to the Central League title, shot down a Kamikaze raid from the upset-minded Upper Darby Royals 33-13 on a dank Saturday morning on the losers' field.

After an initial exchange of punts, the Pioneers found themselves with ball on the Royal 31 after Darby's John Kostans shanked a fourth-down kick. Conestoga quarterback Chuck Myers tried the ground game twice, using brother's Tony and Dave Geter on successive runs, then tossed a pass to back Keith Williams.

On the Conestoga kickoff, Darby's Gary Grimaldi, who as Howard Cosell would say is "one tough cookie" got stood up and blasted by the first Pioneers on the scene, and lost the ball to (guess who) Keith Williams, on his own 26.

Disputed TD

Myers had a bit more defense up against him this time, and had to run it over himself after six plays. Myers' touchdown was disputed because he lunged into the end zone on the last step with two defenders on his back, and immediately fumbled the ball. But the ball went out of the end zone, and Myers was the last one with possession. For his extra effort he got the wind knocked out of him and it was several minutes before Keith Williams could add his second extra kick and eighth point of the game, 14-0.

Conestoga kicked off again, and this time the Royals managed to hold onto the ball until first down.

This time quarterback Wayne Edwards drew up from center without the ball, and linebacker, defensive captain Chris Staley came up with the ball. Six plays

later Bernie Driscoll did a neat hook-in on cornerback Kris Feeney, catching a Myers pass for the Pioneers' third touchdown of the period.

Royals take to the air

With no scoring in the third period, Conestoga mounted a late drive and cashed in with just 41 seconds gone in the fourth quarter. Bernie Driscoll was the receiver, and the play demonstrated the late-game desperation of Upper Darby.

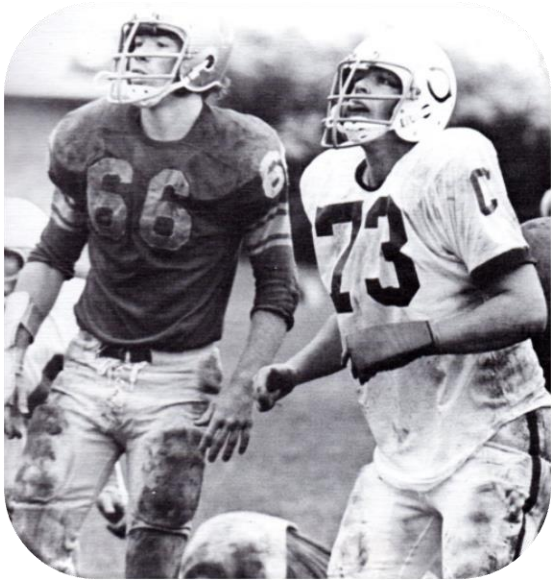
Keith Williams, who must have been scouted as dangerous because of his speed and long yardage gains on reverses, was apparently being keyed upon, and drew a crowd wherever he went. With a third and ten from their own 43, the Pioneers sent Williams rounding out of the backfield and into a sweep of the Royal secondary, clearing out virtually every defender in what amounted to triple coverage.

Driscoll, standing at the 35 with enough time to write a sonnet on the overcast day, caught a floating pass, turned around, and completed a 57-yard pass play from Myers for the longest score of the day.

Myers was to complete only one other pass in the second half but that, too, was a scoring play, this time to end Louie Alleva who obligingly bulldozed his way through and over three defenders on his way to a 30-yard TD.

On the Pioneer side of the defensive line, Chris Staley, John Ames, Euclid Noble and Eric Swanson played a fine game, with Noble claiming the "dirty shirt" award for being at the bottom of the most pileups. Many many interference calls were called on pass plays as both Reggie Williams and Ted Holland were playing close...very, very, close...Mike King, a senior safety was taken from the field in the last period with a possible concussion.

Myers-to-Alleva Combo Paces Pioneers over Warriors in Paolantonio's Farewell

When Conestoga's Bill Paolantonio and Chuck Myers go to Monday's Maxwell Club luncheon to be honored, they ought to take big Louie Alleva along for a free meal.

The big Pioneer end more than earned the luncheon invitation yesterday as he put on a dazzling exhibition of pass receiving that gave Conestoga a dramatic 27-23 victory over a tough bunch of West Chester Warriors.

Playing before a capacity crowd of more than 8,000 at West Chester State's Farrell Stadium, the Pioneers gave retiring coach Paolantonio a great farewell victory as Myers and Alleva hooked up on a tremendous 57-yard scoring pass to provide the margin of victory.

The big TD play, coming with 3:36 remaining in the ballgame overshadowed a great West Chester comeback which saw Mike Hancock's Warriors overcome a 20-0 deficit to roar into a 23-20 lead with about four minutes left in the game.

Weird Kickoff

However, it was the strange kickoff play following the Myers-to-Alleva winning TD aerial strike that provided the weirdest touch to the game which was played in ideal football weather.

Keith Williams, who booted three of four PATs as well as handling the Pioneer kickoff chores, got well under the ball on the unusual kickoff. The ball soared high in the air, was caught by the strong wind and blown back toward the Conestoga kicker.

Three Warriors were around the ball when it finally came down on the West Chester 43, but it was the Pioneers' Dave Scanlon who covered it to give his club possession with 3:24 to go. Myers was unable to pick up a first down, giving it back to the Warriors for one last shot at putting out the decision.

Noble Recovers to Kill Warrior Hopes

However, with 1:44 left and West Chester in possession at its own 36, QB Jim Vilbert fumbled on the first play as Euclid Noble came up with the recovery to kill any Warrior hopes.

However, when Myers went to the air, it was nothing but trouble for Hancock's club as Alleva constantly got great position and burned the Warrior secondary.

He had put the Pioneers on the scoreboard late in the first period when he grabbed an on-the-money-toss from Myers to tally from 31 yards out and, of course, closed out the scoring with his game winning coast-to-coaster.

Interception Sets Up Score

The first Conestoga score was set up by an interception of a Vilbert pass which put Myers and company in business at the West Chester 40-yard line. Myers picked up two big first downs when, in third-and-short yardage situations, the talented Pioneers signal-caller came up with fine calls. The first time he hit Alleva for a 13-yard pickup and in a third-and-two at the 32, sent Geter off tackle for six big yards

The Warrior supporters in the big Thanksgiving Day crowd groaned again just a minute or so later when Ron Till couldn't handle Vilbert's errant pitch and the Pioneers came up with another recovery, this one at the Warriors 25-yard line.

Myers moved in for the score on eight plays, diving the final yard himself as the score moved to 20-0 as Williams blew the point after.

Rugged Pioneer Wall Nails Warriors

However, with 2:34 left before halftime, West Chester finally got its highly-touted ground game moving.

Things bogged down a bit as Eric Swanson, Noble and the rest of the rugged Pioneers front wall nailed Waltz and Pete Hoover before Vilbert connected with Till for a five yard pickup.

The big victory was a great ending to a great season for Bill Paolantonio and his Pioneers. They wound up as Central League champs, posted an 8-1-1 record and gave the coach a victory in this, his last time out as the grid boss of the Berwyn school.

Myers, in addition to his fine passing statistics, was also the Pioneers' leading ground gainer, picking up 53 yards on 20 carries while Waltz led the Warriors rushing attack.
