Pioneers Open with Win

Conestoga slips past W.C. East

BERWYN—The Conestoga High School Football team found out life without Marquis Weeks may not be so bad after all. Weeks, the all-time leading rusher in Conestoga history with over 6,000 yards, is now enrolled at the University of Virginia.

But Conestoga had enough left to defeat West Chester East 20-13, in the nonleague opener for both clubs Friday night. The Pioneers came out smoking, going 76 yards in nine plays to take a 6-0 lead. Sophomore quarterback John D'Agostini hit on all four of his passes during the drive.

"John (D'Agostini) showed a lot of poise for a sophomore," Conestoga head coach Matt Gibson said. "East put a lot of pressure on him and he responded well." West Chester East came right back. The game was delayed at that point for 45 minutes due to lightning flashes.


Conestoga found some lightning of its own after the delay, with Pat Heim racing 90 yards down the left sideline with the Viking kickoff to give 'Stoga the lead back at 12-7. Gibson felt the delay may have worked to the Pioneers' advantage.

"East had just scored when play was stopped and then Pat (Heim) runs the kickoff back," Gibson said. "That was a very big play." The second half was a defensive battle with both teams playing field position. But the young Pioneers finally hit on a big play.

D'Agostini hit Tyler McCraw on a 37-yard touchdown pass with 6:00 left to give Conestoga a 20-13 advantage. McCraw ran under the rainbow from D'Agostini and was wide open down the left sideline.

Pioneer safety Eric Hildenbrand killed a Viking rally with 4:20 left by picking off a Chamness pass over the middle at the Conestoga 20-yard line.

Hildenbrand was all over the field for the Pioneers, as were many of his young teammates. "I just saw the quarterback bring his arm back and cock it a little and I went to the ball," Hildenbrand said. "I felt good on the field all night."

Conestoga ran the clock down to 1:02 when a punt snap sailed over the head of Mark Norcini, and East recovered at the Conestoga 22-yard line with 56 seconds and no time outs left. The Pioneers stiffened right there, sacking Chamness twice and holding on for the hard-fought win.

Gibson was both drained and relieved after the hard-fought win. "We beat a good team in East. They were very physical and disciplined and our young kids responded well."


Conestoga shuts out Springfield

BERWYN—In the first Central League game of the post-Marquis Weeks era, Conestoga awkwardly thumped Springfield, 12-0, but strolled to an enviable 2-0 start to the season. In the process, Weeks' heir at running back, Steve Shea, earned his first 100-yard game by dragging Cougars defenders for 125 yards on 24 carries. His 23rd attempt resulted in the Pioneers' second touchdown and cemented the team's first league victory of the 2000 campaign.

"A win is a win," Conestoga second-year coach Matt Gibson said. "We were very sloppy. We have to overcome the mistakes. We are going to overcome the mistakes." The Pioneers, out of necessity, controlled the pace of the game defensively from the opening snap. Conestoga's front seven ran rampant in the Cougars' backfield, holding Springfield to 56 total yards.

The most imposing statistic came against the run.

The Pioneers limited the Cougars to 52 yards on 36 carries. In the air, Springfield didn't fare much better, completing one of 11 passes for four yards. "Our front played their hearts out," Gibson boasted. "The four of them definitely did their jobs tonight."

That group was led by end Dave Wimer. The senior opened the scoring five minutes into the game by recovering Springfield quarterback's fumble at the Pioneers' 32 and rumbling 68 yards for their first score and first touchdown of his career.


"When it comes down to it, we need defensive plays to win," said Wimer, who narrowly missed a twotouchdown game after dropping a touchdown pass late in the second half. "We knew we had the players to win, so we just kept giving it to them."

The Pioneers shut down any offensive hope the Cougars could generate, allowing just four first downs and halting Springfield's lone trip into the red zone at the 6-yard line. In addition, the Pioneers shoved the Cougars' early second half bid to tie the game at the 25 back 10 yards, courtesy of a Chase Bower sack.

"The first half, Dave (Wimer) had the big play and we kind of got sloppy," Shea said. "We took things for granted. Over halftime, we just got fired up." Fired up turned out to be an understatement. Shea earned 80 of his yards in the next half and teammate Anthony Beard added 65 more, entering the backfield for the first time after the break. The second-half burst erased any doubts to whether Conestoga could move the ball or win the contest.

Shea made the latter official with a 7-yard scramble to cap a 14-play, 65-yard drive early in the fourth quarter. The junior logged 49 yards on the drive and scored initially on a four-yard scamper before it was called back by a holding call. Shea, physically ill from the workload, left the game after the penalty only to return two plays later to score his first touchdown of the season.

"He's a workhorse and getting better with every game," Gibson said. 'Steve's a great back, we have a tradition here. Anytime you get a back over 100 yards it will help you win."



'Stoga stays unbeaten

BERWYN—After two and half games, the kinks are out. And it couldn't have come at a better time for the Conestoga High's football team—one week before it is to face defending Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association Class AAA state champion Strath Haven.

The Pioneers played an opening half of mistakeladen football, which plagued them the first two games of the season Friday night against Central League foe Haverford High. After the homecoming king and queen were announced at the half, however, the Pioneers pulled it all together and played their best stanza of football thus far and cruised to a 35-14 victory.

The triumph came after Conestoga trailed 14-13 at the half, caused by a John D'Agostini interception and subsequent defensive breakdown. Coming out in the third quarter, the Pioneers scored two touchdowns on time-consuming drives paved by a dominant offensive line and slick running by first-year starter Steve Shea at tailback.


The huge quarter left the Pioneers ahead 27-14 and all but sealed their third straight victory to start the season and second league win. "We really let down at the end of the half," Conestoga coach Matt Gibson said. "We were fortunate to establish the run though in the second half and control things. Our offensive line completely controlled the game from then on."

Defensively, a unit that had been stingy all season, but without many turnovers to show, had a similar breakout game to Shea, recovered four fumbles and intercepted two passes. Eric Hildenbrand led the effort when he picked off Haverford quarterback Paul Terra's hurried pass down the far sideline and galloped for a 75-yard touchdown return.

"The nice thing about the team, is we're getting better every week," Gibson said. He hopes that trend continues next week against the defending state champs.





Defending state champs impressive in win over Conestoga

NETHER PROVIDENCE—Conestoga High School and Strath Haven had identical 3-0 records entering Friday night's Central League football contest. In addition, both had dominated league competition toward those marks—Conestoga outlasting Springfield and Haverford in two very unchallenging affairs as the Panthers rolled to like victories over Springfield and Lower Merion.

To add to comparative thought, each opened their respective offenses with three-yard scampers off tackle, Conestoga's Steve Shea doing so first. The similarities, however, ended there in front of a packed house at George L. King Field.

The defending Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association champions saw to it as Strath Haven rolled to a 45-12 victory behind 392 total yards of offense that yielded a mere 131. The thrashing left little doubt to who was king in the Central, and the Pioneers smarting to pick up the pieces.

The youngsters that grace the Pioneers' sideline succumbed early to the first state-championship quality team many of them had ever seen. "I don't think we knew what a state championship caliber team looked like," flabbergasted Conestoga quarterback John D'Agostini said. "When you get sacked in a three step drop, you know something is wrong."

A stinging that began to reap reaction midway through the second quarter. Conestoga safety Pat Heim

swiped a Connor pass, as Strath Haven threatened to go up 35, and raced down to the sideline to the Pioneers' 32-yard line. The next play, D'Agostini threw a pretty touchdown pass down the far sideline into the leaping arms of Dewey Burke.

The touchdown drew the first blood the Pioneers could manage all evening and rattled the squad awake. In the waning moments of the half, Connor was sacked with nearly a minute and a half remaining. The decision was made by Conestoga coach Matt Gibson immediately to try and make something happen by calling a timeout to get possession.

After all, the Pioneers had nothing to lose and everything to gain. Conestoga's Terrance Smith made his coach look good as he raced in to block the ensuing punt, and sophomore Kevin Stach pounced on it to give the Pioneers the football on the Panthers' 30. Four plays and a minute later, D'Agostini picked up his second touchdown pass when he found Tyler McCraw on a slant.

Sophomore D'Agostini, finishing with two touchdown passes and 98 yards in the air, was no small part of that learning process as he completed more than half his passes to six different receivers. He did so without any serious running threat as lead-back Shea was held to 47 yards on 17 carries and the Pioneers as a whole were limited to 33.

"John will be a very good make that —is a good football player," Gibson proclaimed following the loss. "He's going to get a lot better, he works real hard in there. We're going to learn from this."

UPPER DARBY—One play on a football field can sum up an evening very easily. At least that's what Conestoga High found out in a Central League showdown with Upper Darby Friday night at Memorial Field.

Midway through the first quarter, Pioneers' linebacker/tight-end Chase Bower halted an impressive Royals' drive with a big-time interception at midfield. The turnover put Conestoga in great position to score the contest's first points at Upper Darby's 45-yard line.

Unfortunately for the Pioneers, Bower's pick wasn't the play that would symbolize the next 44 minutes. The glimmers of success followed by the costly mistakes plagued the Pioneers throughout the

The two play, 30-yard drive, set up by a Jon Weller pick, was the brand of football the Pioneers rode to their first three victories—an opportunistic turnover, followed by Shea's grind-out running. The junior finished with 95-yards on the ground.

Conestoga sophomore quarterback John D'Agostini threw for 240 yards and two touchdowns to pace the Pioneers (3-3, 4-The explosive Conestoga ground game accounted for 240 yards on 32 attempts. Junior tailback Steve Shea led the way, rushing for 160 yards and a touchdown on just 13 carries. Senior fullback Anthony Beard contributed with 94 yards on the ground and two touchdowns.

The key to the Pioneer victory was the offensive

line's stellar performance. The line pushed and shoved Bulldawg defenders creating huge holes that enabled the Conestoga running game to thrive and supplied D'Agostini with ample time to locate open receivers.

"Offensively, we controlled the line of scrimmage and so we did a good job running the football," said Conestoga head coach Matt Gibson.

The Pioneer offense relied on the play-action pass to manufacture scoring opportunities. On Conestoga's first play from scrimmage, D'Agostini faked the handoff to Beard and then launched a pass down the middle of the field to senior receiver Dan Plastino. D'Agostini's completion resulted in a 61-yard reception for Plastino. Shea then scored on a 16-yard run, giving Conestoga an early edge.

"John D'Agostini did a great job on the play-action passes. We felt Chase Bower was going to have a big game catching the ball and on the play action pass he was able to do that," said Gibson. Bower had a huge game, leading the Pioneers with four receptions and 125 yards against Lower Merion (1-6, 2-6).

"They (Lower Merion) were putting too many men up on the line to stop Shea, because he's been having



such a great year, so we had to use the play action," said Bower, who caught a 91-yard touchdown pass on a play-action fake late in the third quarter.







The Raiders promptly fumbled the kickoff and the



made the big plays when they had to," Gibson said. "We finished tonight."




After Gibson called for a timeout, Conestoga lined up for the two-point conversion. D'Agostini took the snap from under center and rolled out of the pocket towards the right sideline. On the run he found senior tight end Chase Bower open in the end zone for a successful conversion. Bower's catch sent the game into overtime tied at 17.

"It's always a dogfight against Ridley," said D'Agostini. "They always play us tough."

The Pioneers won the overtime coin toss and elected to defend. The Green Raiders took possession of the ball on the Conestoga's 10-yard line. Senior tailback Kyle Stockton was stuffed on three of his carries by the Pioneers' defense, forcing a field goal from kicker Mike Snow. Ridley now held the lead at 20-17.

"The defense really stepped it up today," said Gibson. "They were aggressive and overall, they did a



That was the opening paragraph from the Daily Local report of the Pioneers' opening game for the 2000 season.
