Others players who have had T-E has had trouble chiefly because some experience and on whom its material has been running Smeigh will depend for needed small.



UPSETS BERWYN RADNOR GRID FOE

Colona Goes Over Lone Score in Gripping Game at Wayne

A gritty little eleven from the upper reaches of the Main Line came down to Wayne yesterday afternoon to extend the streak of misfortune which has dogged the Radnor High team. Coach Jerry Smeigh's Berwyn club, as scrappy a little club as you'll find in the entire Suburban Conference, handed the Red Raiders a 7-0 defeat yesterday on the losers' field.

Th victory was the first turned in by a Berwyn team over Radnor at Wayne in 14 long years.

Scoring a touchdown in the first period when a poor pass from cen-tre gave them the game-winning "break", the team from the consolidated schools of Tredyffrin and Easton townships clung grimly to a 7-0 lead through to the bitter end.


The victory, their second in Radnor in as many years, was the first of the season for Berwyn. The setback marked the third in a row, each at the hands of Conference rivals, for Jules Prevost's hapless Raiders.

There was just one important break in the whole ball game, and this break cost Radnor the game. Early in the first period, with the ball resting on their own 25-yard line, Radnor's centre, Art Griffith, shot a hard, high pass back to "Whip" White. White had no chance to get the ball as it soared over his head. Before he could wheel and pourse on the ovel Rob. wheel and pounce on the oval, Bob Isinger, Berwyn guard, fell upon the ball to give Berwyn possession on the Radnor five-yard stripe.

Boys From Berwyn Scored Winning Touchdown on Fumble Near Goal Line

Sad to relate, but Friday's football jousting on the Radnor High School greensward left Coach Jules Prevost's luckless Red and White grid starts, for the third straight week, directly behind the eight ball. This time it was our friends and neighbors from up-the-line, Tred.-East. High School, who applied the lethal dose, 7-0—not too stiff a dose, but stiff enough to make the boys wonder if they'll ever get started on a winning way.

Once more a head decided the outcome, a poor pass from center, or a missed signal by a Radnor back, left a loose ball on the Red and White eight yard line, which Berwyn was quick to cover, and in three plays Colona broke through left tackle for the only touchdown of the game. The score came in the first period, and although Radnor theatened twice to tally afterwards, the gritty little eleven from up the road dug in their toes and finished bloody but unbowed.

Although considerably outweighed, the Berwynites presented a well-coached, scrappy little outfit that capitalized their one opportunity with a great big touchdown, and after all, that's the pay-off. According to the statisticians, it was the first Berwyn victory on the Radnor field in 14 years, and to those of us who remember the salad days of Radnor football when Berwyn was lucky to escape with anything less than a 30-0 trimming—oh, well, it must be the New Deal's fault.

In spots Radnor didn't look bad at all, but unfortunately they were the wrong spots. Fumbling, off-side play, and an ineffectual attack were the three ruinations of Radnor, and until they are overcome, Red and White rooters will have many a headache. The tackling was a big improvement, and for the most part, Berwyn could do little with the Radnor line. Monte, acting captain for the game, was the only consistent ground-gainer, and inside the Berwyn 30-yard line even he could do little or nothing. The Radnor spirit was good and the boys were in there trying from start to finish, but they just didn't have enough stuff to win.

The customers had barely seated themselves—and by the way, there werent's too many customers—before Berwyn scored the only touchdown of the game. An exchange of kicks gave Radnor the ball on her own 25-yard

line, and on the first play the Red and White center passed the ball far, wide and handsomely to the Radnor's 8-yard line, where a Berwyn lineman gathered it in to his manly bosom. There's a chance there might have been a sleepy Radnor back on the play, for all we know, so we'll only give Center Griffith an assist on the error, but believe us, when Center Griffith snaps them back, he really snaps them back. Anyway, it was Berwyn's ball on Radnor's 8-yard line, and it took Captain Colona just three plays to cross the Red and White final line, making the score 6-0, and creating much excitement among Berwyn rooters. Colona's first try for the extra point was wide of the posts, but Radnor was offsides and he was given another chance to make good, which he did in a big way, with a snappy one right through the middle of the uprights, making it 7-0, and also making Signor Colona a very big man in Berwyn last Friday night, we'll bet vou.

Radnor's best scoring chance came in the second period when Byasse committed a grievous error of judgment in catching Monti's long Radnor punt on his own 2-yard line and being promptly dumped by the Radnor ends. In this stern predicament Kelly kicked out to his own 25-yard line, and the Red and White had a chance to go places. For a moment it looked as though they might at that, for Monti and Allen collaborated in a first down on the Berwyn 10-yard line. The next four plays were of a different color, however, and the sorte ended with Berwyn taking the ball on downs on their own 15-yard line.

Features of the game were the kicking of Kelly and Monti, Griffith's defensive play and long runs by D'Ambrosia and Monti. Allen, substitute for the injured White in the Radnor backfield, also looks like a comer. The line-up and score:

Dashes 60 and 30 Yards For Touchdowns in 29th Annual Game

Berwyn High School's football eleven has little to be thankful for today. West Chester's gridders invaded the Main Line this morning ard trounced Ollie Robinson's Tredyffrin-Easttown eleven by a 20-0 score before a Turkey Day crowd of 5000.

Thus the locals brought their season to a sad close for they are able to show only one victory.

By clinching the decision over the Robinsonmen the charges of Harold Zimmerman walked off with the Chester County championship. If Berwyn had won it would have virtually ruined the Zippers' chances for titular laurels.

West Chester was held scoreless in the first period when it earned two first downs to one for the Main. Liners. But the invaders struck with a death-dealing shock in the second and before Berwyn's adherents realized what was happening West Chester had scored twice. The final six-pointer was made in the third period right after the kickoff.

Locals Rally

Berwyn rallied gamely in the last period but couldn't push over a score. In that chapter the locals got four first downs to three for West Chester. However, at no time in the game were the Robinsonmen able to get within the winners 20-yard line. Each team had eight first downs.

West Chester scored its first touchdown on a 20-yard pass after Berwyn had held on the 15. Johnson had cut around right end on a reverse and galloped from his own 45-yard line to the Berwyn 15. Another reverse was smeared, and then a pass was grounded. Jesse Lewis then faded back and heaved another to Johnson, who was clear when Berwyn was caught napping. Lewis' try for point by placement was blocked.

With the half almost over, Berwyn opened up with a pass attack on its own 24 and it was a boomerang. Lewis intercepted one on the 30 and sprinted for the second touchdown. This time the try for point via placement was accu-



Berwyn's chief strength this fall lies in the power of its veteran backfield combination. Its line is a good one, but the real power of its attack comes from a quartet of experienced ball carriers, accurate passers and dangerous kickers. All four of its starting backs appeared against West Chester in 1935, when Berwyn was on the short end of a 20 to 0 score.

Captain Bill Colona, who appears at the left halfback post is the key man of the T.-E. backfield. He is a triple threat man and is capable of employing every weapon of attack in a capable manner. Aside from being a shifty and hard-running ball-carrier he is a passer of marked ability, a punter, who is always a threat because of his quick kicks and an artist in the matter of placement kicks.

Captain Colona is paired with "Buck" Thornton, a flash colored lad, at the halfback posts. Thornton is outstanding because of his ability to thread his way through and open field and to break away on end runs. He is also a pass receiver of top rating.


Kelly Versatile

Frank 'Shipwreck' Kelly does the quarterbacking for the T-E Terrors and likewise is their most dependable punter. Further than this he shifts from quarterback to end on certain pass plays because of his knack of snaring aerials with almost 100 per cent. effectiveness.

The fourth member of the Berwyn backfield is "Patsy" D'Ambrosia, a hard-charging fullback, who is relied upon for most of the team's line-plunging. Like his three fellow-backs, he is a good passer and is given plenty of opportunity to exercise that talent.

On the line Coach Gerry Smeigh is planning to start Jim Townsend and Dick Dixon, as ends; Lou Whitworth and "Gordy" Hickman, as tackles; Bob Isinger and Howard Tarr, as guards, and Johnny Byassee, at center. Captain Bill Colona, of Berwyn High, is leading the Suburban Conference, at this writing, in the matter of converting points-after-touchdown. He has to his credit five conversions, all through the medium of placement kicks. These points, along with four touchdowns, place him among the ten highest scorers of the Conference with a total of 29. Colona, now Berwyn's regular quarterback, is rapidly gaining recognition as one of the county's outstanding stars. He is a real leader and is the sparkplug of the powerful Berwyn attack.

Incidentally, Captain Colona and his T.-E. Terrors face a severe test this week when they encounter Downingtown High, at the Paper-town, on Saturday afternoon. After tying Glen-Nor in their opener and losing to Pottstown in their second game, the Main Liners won four in a row. Radner, Upper Merion, Coatesville and Haverford were added to their list in consecutive order. If they are to remain in the fight for the county laurels they will have to win over Downingtown. And after Downingtown comes Phoenixville and West Chester. This gives you a rough idea of the job Coach Jerry Smeigh has out out for him in the closing weeks of the campaign.
