

WEST GOSHEN—The John Vogan football era at Conestoga High School got off to a good start Friday night, albeit a shortened one. Conestoga defeat West Chester East 22-0 in a nonleague contest that ended late in the third quarter because of threatening weather.

This was the Pioneers' first game with Vogan as the head coach. Vogan was an assistant coach under Matt Gibson last season. Gibson recently became Conestoga's Athletic Director.

The Pioneers scored on the game's opening series. Quarterback John D'Agostini connected with Dewey Burke on a 26-yard touchdown pass with about a nine minutes left in the first quarter. The pass was thrown into coverage, as three East players surrounded Burke, but none could come up with the interception.

On the extra-point attempt, Conestoga used a fake with the ball hiked right to Lamont Smith, who ran for




JOHN D'AGOSTINI Junior 6-3, 215 Quarterback

the two point conversion and the 8-0 lead. The Pioneers closed out the first quarter with a very big play.


D'Agostini connected with Pat Himes on the 73yard touchdown pass. Eric Hildenbrand's successful point extra kick gave Conestoga a 15-0 lead with 31 seconds left in the quarter. D'Agostini 91-yards passing in the first half and finished with 160 yards. East held runner Steve Shea to 10

carries for 40 yards for the game. Last season, Shea rushed for 1,276 yards.

Himes capped the scoring for the Pioneers with a 4-yard run in the second quarter. Also for Conestoga, Smith added an interception of a Tom Duncan pass in the third quarter.





Conestoga gets defensive in Central League opener Pioneers top Springfield, earns first league victory

SPRINGFIELD—The Conestoga High School football team served notice to the rest of the Central League it will hit anything that moves. "I can't say enough about our defense," Conestoga head coach John Vogan said after the bruising 26-7 win. "The physical nature of our team started in the offseason weight room."

But it was the Conestoga offense that was roaring early in the game. After a Cougar three-and-out series to start the game, Conestoga received a 26-yard punt

return from Dewey Burke to set the Pioneers up at the Springfield 25-yard line. Pioneer quarterback John D'Agostini then hit Pat Heim over the middle for a 19-yard score.

Conestoga took an 8-0 lead after a two-point conversion. The Conestoga defense took over from there. Mike Messina hit Cougar quarterback from the blind side, forcing a fumble which was recovered by linebacker Andrew Colbert. The fumble

put the Pioneers in shape as Steve Shea went untouched around right end for a 16-yard score.

Another two-point conversion put Springfield behind the eight-ball, 16-0, after just five minutes had

elapsed. Colbert, who was all over the field, along with Messina, Eric Hildenbrand and Aris Byrd—who had three sacks—said picking up the fumble was easy. "I just went after the ball and fell on it," Colbert said. "We are a lot more physical than last year. We are stressing physical play and being tough late in the game."

Colbert than came up big again when he stopped along Springfield drive with a nice

interception on the right side at the Pioneers four-yard line. "I just stayed on my man and did not let up," Colbert said.

Vogan was very impressed with his entire defense—Colbert in particular. "This is a kid who was hurt last season and worked very hard to get back," Vogan said. "He worked hard in the weight room and is doing a good job at inside linebacker."

Conestoga put the game away with Eric Hildenbrand's 26-yard field goal and Shea's four-yard run. Shea finished the game with 107 tough yards on 14 carries, to go along with D'Agostini's 127 yards passing.

But Conestoga figured it had a potent offense coming into the season. What most impressed Vogan was the tenacity of his defense.

The 50-yard pass set up a five yard touchdown run by Steve Shea for the 6-0 Pioneer lead. A 37-yard field goal late in the second quarter cut the Pioneers' lead to 6-3.

D'Agostini launched the second long pass of the game for the Pioneers with 19 seconds remaining in the third quarter. After the Fords' 10-yard penalty put the ball at the Haverford 32 yard line. D'Agostini faked the hand-off to Shea and connected over the middle to wide out Dewey Burke inside the five yard line, who ran the ball in for the touchdown. A two-point conversion pass from D'Agostini to Chase Bower set up the 14-3 score.

D'Agostini credited the quick strike in the second half and the yards gained on the ground to a strong offensive line. In the second half, the offensive line created holes for Steve Shea to move through. Shea rushed for 126 yards, including 84 yards in the second half. 

Conestoga shows it character in key league win over Penncrest




Pioneers handle Upper Darby

Trailing 8-7 at the intermission and through three quarters, Upper Darby (4-2,4-1) fell behind 15-7 with 5:17 remaining in the fourth following a 1-yard run by Conestoga's Pat Heim.

An unintentional squib kick on the ensuing kickoff was recovered by the Pioneers' Terrance Smith, setting up a 34yard scoring jaunt by Shea on the next play to make the score 21-7. Believe it or not, the same scenario played out on the next kickoff as Smith recovered another squib kick, this one mishandled by Upper Darby.

By then, the game was over. "I have to look at the film to see exactly what happened," Gentile said. "But for whatever reason (stuff) like that happens to us. When was the last time you saw two unintentional onside kicks recovered."

Regardless of the tough breaks encountered by the Royals, Conestoga did everything it needed to pull off the upset. Offensively, the Pioneers clicked. The same could be said defensively. With one loss, a hard-fought defeat to Strath Haven, the Pioneers could share the league title with four more Central wins and an Upper Darby triumph over Strath Haven. 


into Friday's nonleague game with a struggling Coatesville team riding high. The Red Raiders were 2-4 before taking the field at Conestoga.


the offense opened up for Conestoga. Shea gained 128 yards in the second half and helped a D'Agostini-to-Ryan Randels touchdown to seal the game.

Conestoga's quarterback John D'Agostini scored the first touchdown of the game on a keeper up the middle. A two-point conversion run by Lamont Smith gave Conestoga an 8-0 lead with 1:42 left in the first.

"We were relying on the run to take us down the field it seemed like throughout the game," D'Agostini said. "The passing was just like a bonus. We did what we could and the two times down the end zone, they really packed it in. The defense did a great job. The line pushed but it just didn't fall our way."

Each time, Conestoga went for the score rather than kicking a field goal. "I didn't think about kicking," Vogan said. "In a game like this, you've got to put points on the board. We knew we had an explosive ability to score on one play."

Radnor scored their lone touchdown on an 85-yard run by fullback Scott Kirker. After Conestoga stopped Radnor on their last drive of the game, the Pioneers ran the length of the field on their last drive. 

That's nice, but it seemed someone forgot to tell the Pioneers that in the first round of the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association Class AAAA playoffs Saturday. Because despite falling behind Cheltenham twice, allowing a two-touchdown lead fall in the fourth quarter and missing a golden opportunity two yards from the goal in overtime, the Pioneers still gritted out a 34-31 decision in double overtime for a trip to the state quarterfinals.

Two field goals by kicker Tyler McCraw in overtime proved to be the difference as the Pioneers (11-1) grabbed just their second postseason victory ever and a date with Neshaminy, 37-20 winners over Downingtown Friday, on the road at a time and day to be determined.

"If you want the truth, I didn't envision this," Conestoga coach John Vogan said with a grin. "I envisioned us having success, being competitive.

However, I think the season changed for us with our win over Upper Darby. We came of age when we came back to beat them earlier in the season and from that point on our kids have been playing with confidence.

"Now they believe they can win every time they go out." That attitude was evident early in the contest and often by late afternoon as the Pioneers had to pull out everything they could against a favored Cheltenham (10-2) squad. On the opening kickoff 'Stoga wide out

Jon Weller fumbled the ball and the Pioneers recovered on their own three-yard line.

After a three-and-out drive, the Panthers took over on the Conestoga 28 and eight plays later, scored a touchdown when quarterback Christopher Hawkins found wide out Paul Sandher in the end zone on a busted field goal attempt.

But instead of falling apart after the shocking touchdown, as inexperienced playoff teams shook off some dropped passes to execute a masterful 10-play, 59-yard drive capped by a 26-yard touchdown strike from D'Agostini to Weller.

"You can't let dropped passes effect your passing game," D'Agostini said. "All my receivers can catch and they want to catch and run." After tying the contest, however, the Pioneers failed to take advantage of two Cheltenham turnovers on the Panthers' next two possessions. As a result the failed opportunities led to a late drive that the Panthers converted for a score.

The score left the Pioneers trailing at the half, but not out. They had gone too far to fold. "In the locker room (Vogan) challenged us and asked if we were going to give up," said Conestoga running back Steve Shea, who collected a game high 169 yards on the ground. "We said no way and we went out to prove it."


The Pioneers did just that with three unanswered touchdowns in the third and fourth quarters. To start the half, Shea scored on runs of one and 12 yards. D'Agostini capped the scoring as he collected his second touchdown pass on a beautiful fade pattern toward the corner of the end zone to Pat Heim from eight yards out with nine minutes, eight seconds left in the game to give the Pioneers a 28-14 lead.

After allowing dropped balls and varying line play keep them from sustained drives in the first half, the Pioneers simply blew Cheltenham off the ball during the third quarter and early into the fourth as Shea collected yards in chunks and D'Agostini used his time in the pocket to find receivers with ease.

"The offensive line, was the difference and there was no doubt about it," Shea said. "They blocked unbelievably to open up holes for me and to give (D'Agostini) time. Their blocking was outstanding.

With its playoff lives up for grabs, Cheltenham answered the Pioneers' run with a two-touchdown flurry of its own on magnificent drives—knotting things up when Patterson walked into the end zone with

just 55 seconds remaining.



Though as it proved earlier, Conestoga was not done with the postseason as two parts of the Pioneers' attack which had appeared shaky in the fourth quarter came back in big ways in the overtime.

The first was kicker McCraw, who kicked field goals of 22 and 32 yards, respectively, to keep the Pioneers alive in the extra session. The second was the defense which had twice held

Patterson and the Panthers out of the end zone and intercepted the ball on Cheltenham's second try at the goal when Pioneers end Calvin Corvaia tipped the ball into the hands of tackle Ron Shepard.





And after that stop, the Pioneers stand just three victories from the school's first PIAA Championship.

Needless to say the Pioneers are not glad just getting to this point, regardless of the fact not many picked them to do so.

"Getting here has hit a couple of people, but it hasn't really hit me," D'Agostini said. "At 12:01 tonight I'll be thinking of the next game. None of us are happy to just get here, we came to win."


D'Agostini started to get time and time and brought the Pioneers dep into Redskin territory but a pitch to
