T-E High School will open its football season against Lansdale tomorrow evening on the Berwyn field. Last year the game was won by Lansdale by one touchdown.

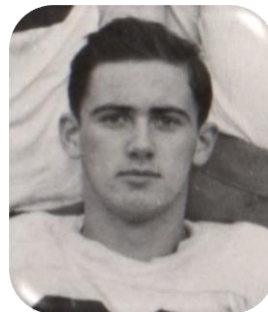

T-E Wins, 19-0, at Haverford

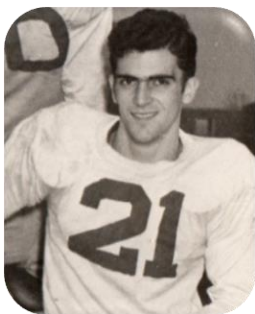

The T-E High School team wasted no time last Friday night in getting started against Haverford High School. The first quarter was only five minutes under way when Tom Miller set sail off his right tackle and went 87 yards for a touchdown. In all due respect to Tom's running ability, it was great blocking by every member of the team that enabled Miller to get loose.

Things looked bad prior to Miller's run. T-E fumbled on their own 25. In a few plays, Haverford went to the 12, and it appeared that the big red team was on its way. The Berwyn line showed its true fighting spirit and held four downs, and then a few plays later shook Miller loose for his long run for the only score in the first quarter.

In the second period, Haverford carried to T-E's 13-yard line but again the Bulldog line held four downs. The half ended 6-0.

The Haverford team came out the second half determined to duplicate Lansdale's feat of the previous week. An alert T-E team was ready for

whatever power Haverford had to show. Leonard Zonetti broke through time and time again to throw the opposing backs for losses. Bob Pollard seemed to be in every play. Yerkes Wilson was a handy boy to have around, falling on a Haverford fumble to slow-up the opposing drive. Joe Pezzotti performed well in the line.

In the last quarter, the T-E rooters were praying for time to run out as the Haverford team began a desperate attempt to even the score. They were willing to settle for a 6-0 victory. Bob Clark had other ideas however, when he intercepted a pass on the 50 after six men had batted the pigskin around like a volleyball. Then, Harry Mitchell took the ball on a 40-yard jaunt for a touchdown to put the local boys ahead 12-0. A few minutes later, Bob Pollard showed the crowd he could run as well as plunge, by intercepting a pass on his own 35, and he outraced the field to score. Again fine blocking by the Bulldogs made possible Pollard's run. Eli McLaughlin threw a block on two men to pave Pollard's way. The final score was T-E - 19, Haverford - 0.

Further credit must go to the coaches: Meyer, Keehn and Metzler for their fine handling of the team.

Stango Paces T-E Eleven To Victory

*Scores Three Touchdowns and Heaves
Pass for Fourth - Outclassing Rivals 25-0*

Tredyffrin-Easttown High, paced by Quarterback Ralph Stango, registered its second win in three starts at the expense of Conshohocken High by a 25-0 score under lights at Berwyn last night.

Stango scored three touchdowns, one on an 80-yard run, and he tossed a 20-yard scoring pass to Bill Patton. He also passed to Hughes for the lone T-E conversion.

Scoring a touchdown in each period, the Bulldogs displayed complete mastery over Conshohocken.



Conshohocken Loses to T-E

The Bulldogs ran true to form again last Friday night by scoring in the first five minutes of play. Conshohocken received on their own eight-yard line and were forced to kick when they failed to penetrate the strong T-E line. The local boys took over at midfield and from there, it was a steady march down the field with Miller, Pollard and Zonetti alternating in lugging the leather: three yards, five yards, seven yards and on and on towards pay dirt. With inches to go for a touchdown everyone expected Pollard to do his specialty of crashing the line. Conshohocken expected it too for the whole team seemed to lunge at big Bob as Stango pulled a quarterback sneak and went over the goal standing up.

Pollard's kick for the extra point was blocked.

A fumble set up the second score when Stango recovered the loose ball on the visitors' 22-yard line. Pollard reeled off a first down to the 11. As the Conshy line closed in to stop Pollard, Stango flipped a pass to Bill Patton in the end zone. The extra point was added on another pass from Stango to Les Hughes.

With 30 seconds to go, Conshohocken showed they still weren't licked by taking the kickoff from their own 10 to Berwyn's 29. Smith went through the entire local team and was on his way to score until hauled down from behind by little Bobby Clark. The half ended with T-E leading 13-0.

Smith's run did more good than harm for it showed the Garnet team they had to be awake on every play.

In the third quarter neither team threatened as the ball remained around midfield until suddenly Ralph Stango took off on an eighty yard jaunt to make the score 19-0. A desperate Conshohocken team began throwing long passes in the last quarter. Bob Pollard picked one of these out of the air and again T-E began to move with Ralph Stango once more scoring from the one-yard line.

With a comfortable lead, Coach Meyer sent in Pennypacker for Pollard. He showed plenty of power, making several substantial gains in the final minutes.

Credit must go to the T-E line for their fine performance. Joe Pezzotti played heads up football by falling on a Conshohocken fumble and breaking into their backfield to throw the runners for losses.

Radnor Defeats T-E In Wild Final Period

Five touchdowns were registered in a wild fourth period as Radnor High upset Tredyffrin-Easttown High, 24-19, in their annual game at Wayne yesterday afternoon. The winning touchdown was scored by Radnor on a long pass in the end zone.

Radnor went ahead in the early minutes of play when it scored on an 18-yard end run. On the kick-off which followed, Tom Miller took the ball on his own 12 and raced 88

yards to score. *This was his third 88-yard run of the season.* A conversion put T-E ahead at 7-6.

The old rivals battled through the next two periods without a score. In the second quarter, T-E twice halted Radnor drives at the 10. In the third period, the Bulldogs moved to the Radnor 14 but lost the ball on a fumble. A Radnor advance in that stanza was checked at the five.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, a Raider smashed over from the one-yard line to put

Radnor ahead at 12-7. On the third play after the kick-off, Ralph Stango passed to Bob Pollard on the 50, and the big back raced to a score. This gave T-E a 13-12 lead.

With three minutes to go Radnor scored again to lead 18-13. Two plays later, Stango heaved a pass to Bob Clark, who raced 50 yards for a touchdown to put T-E ahead, 19-18. The last-minute pass by Radnor then proved Tredyffrin-Easttown's undoing. The long pass to the end zone made the score 24-19.

T-E Tops Upper Merion, 27-14

Last Friday night the crowd at the Tredyffrin-Easttown - Upper Merion game stood up as the National Anthem was played a few minutes before the kickoff. They remained standing the rest of the evening as touchdown after touchdown was reeled off. Upper Merion, always noted for its razzle-dazzle type of football, put on the expected show for the crowd.

There was a young man in the Upper Merion backfield who without a doubt is the finest passer that anyone will ever see this season. A right hand passer who can run to his left and whip passes to the extreme right of the field, a trick that even Sammy Baugh couldn't do. This young man was injured slightly in the third period and as he left the field, the Berwyn crowd and T-E players cheered him, not because he was leaving the

game, but because they were cheering a great player.

There was another young man who received cheers from both sides as he left the game. This was Bob Pollard. Always renowned as a line plunger, a kid who could dash through center for a needed first down or a touchdown, has added something this year to his greatness. Twice he got away for long runs, one for 60 yards and the other 78 yards. His runs came when they were needed most.

Upper Merion scored first on the second play after getting the ball. The Bulldogs opened the game by receiving but a fumble and a penalty backed them up to their goal line. Pollard was forced to boot from his end zone. Upper Merion took the ball at midfield and brought it back to its 35. An end sweep scored the initial touchdown. T-E came right back and scored on Pollard's long run. Upper Merion

received but they were unable move the ball. On third down a fumble by Upper Merion on their 25-yard line set up the Bulldog's second touchdown.



Dave DeRafelo, a sophomore who has done a great job of filling the injured Hayes Slider's shoes this year, fell on the loose ball. A few plays later, Ralph Stango threw a touchdown pass to Les Hughes, but the six points were voided due to the locals being off-sides. Undaunted by this, Tom Miller swept around right end to put the Garnet ahead 12-7. Miner Vail then made it 13-7.

Midway through the second half, Bob Pollard made his second long run going 78 yards to score. On this play T-E needed one yard for a first down, and Bob was called on to do his specialty. He made the first down with ease, plus 77 yards to spare. It was typical of Knute Rockne's statement that, "Every play is a touchdown play if each man carries out his assignment." Each T-E man did, and Bob went all the way.

Upper Merion received to open up the second half. They started on

their own 30, and "Sammy Baugh" McKernon completed pass after pass to his receivers until finally McKernon himself went over.

The Bulldogs received and duplicated U.M.'s 70-yard march by going all the way on a series of plays. Ralph Stango completed the



scoring for the evening when he went over from the nine-yard line.

Bobby Clark showed he can play offense as well as defense by

cutting loose on a 65-yard run. Miner Vail was uncovered as a place kicker, kicking three for three. The line played well. Coach Meyer is now working toward the Coatesville game.

T-E SURPRISES

Bulldogs In Close Win Over Coates

Conversion by Minor Vail Yields 19-18 Edge as Each Team Tabs Three TD's

The only extra point conversion recorded in a game, which produced six touchdowns, gave Tredyffrin-Easttown High a 19-18 win over Coatesville High in a see-saw battle before some 3,000 fans at Berwyn, Saturday afternoon. The T-E margin of victory was provided when Minor Vail converted with a placement kick after the Bulldogs registered their second touchdown.

Raiders Score Early

The Red Raiders, overwhelming in pre-game predictions, took a 6-0 lead in the first quarter, capitalizing on a T-E fumble which gave them possession within 35 yards of the pay-off zone.

Early in the second quarter Bob Pollard, stellar T-E fullback, booted 80 yards to the Coatesville one-yard line. The Coates tried a quick-kick but it carried only 15 yards. Two plays later Tom Miller went 15-yards around right end to score for the Bulldogs.

Two-Man TD

The gridders of Coach Ernest Meyer went ahead, 12-6, on a sensational play in the opening minutes of the second half. Failing to gain after taking the halftime kick-off, Coatesville punted to the T-E 15. Leonard Zonetti took the punt and raced to the 50, where he lateraled to Ralph Stango, who rambled straight ahead for a touchdown. It was after this score that Vail booted the all-important extra point.

The Coates fought right back. After taking the kick-off on their own 40, the Red Raiders marched 60-yards to score and cut the T-E

lead to 13-12. A Coatesville fumble, recovered by Clarence Weldon at midfield set off another T-E touchdown march soon after the fourth period opened. Two plays carried to a first down at the 35 and from that point, Pollard heaved a looping aerial to right end Les Hughes. Hughes was on the five when he caught the pass and fell across the goal line.

Miss Final Chance

Battling all of the way, Coatesville racked up its third touchdown on a drive, which started when it took the T-E kick-off at its own 30. The Raiders crossed midfield on ground football, and then went to the air with a 40-yard scoring pass. This gave them a final chance to knot the count with a conversion, but their kicker could not get a bead on the area between the uprights.

Berwyn Gridders To Face Whippets

Berwyn High School gridders, following the hard-earned victory over Coatesville High School last Saturday afternoon, are reporting for practice daily to prepare for this week's contest with the Downingtown High School Whippets.

In the thrilling game last Saturday, the Garnet and Gray nosed out the Red Raiders 19 to 18. This victory was made possible by the great work of the Berwyn Line. When asked to name one or two players who were outstanding in the forward wall, Coach Meyer said: "All of them." And that's just the way it was. Noted for their strong line, Coatesville was expected by many to push the lighter Berwyn boys all over the lot. The coaches and the T-E team, however, did not share this opinion, as they proved in their well-earned victory.

Caesar Natalie started at left end for the first time, being moved up from the J.V.'s to take the place of the injured Bill Patton. He proved that he is now a first stringer and varsity material by breaking up plays at the line of scrimmage.

George Bartosh and Yerkes Wilson teamed up on the left side of the line to stop play after play. On several occasions, they broke through to bring the runner down from behind. Eli McLaughlin, at center, played his usual steady

game. Dave DeRafelo and Hayes Slider alternated at guard. When asked about playing against the big 220 pound Fleck, Hayes replied, "He didn't look so big on the ground." His statement was typical of the fighting spirit of the team. Cliff Evens played excellently both on offense and defense. Clarence Weldon was especially alert, and it was he who helped set up T-E's final touchdown by recovering a Coatesville fumble on the visitors 35-yard line. Francis Allen also snared a loose ball as Coatesville Raiders were driving for a TD.

The boys from Scott High scored first after they capitalized on a T-E fumble early in the first quarter. Don Urbine's kick never got off the ground as the fighting T-E line surged in. Then for the sixth time this season, the Garnet came from behind to score. With the ball on their own twenty, Bob Pollard dropped back to his ten and booted the ball over the head of the safety man, and it finally rolled out on the one foot line. McGowan, on a second down dropped back for a quick kick but was rushed by Bartosh. The ball traveled only twenty yards to right end to tie up the game. T-E failed to convert. The half ended 6-6.

Coatesville received to open the second half. Unable to gain McGowan kicked to T-E's fifteen where the ball was taken by Ralph Stango. He brought the ball to the

forty where he ran into a host of tacklers. With good blocking and his own sheer power, he drove through and came into the clear surrounded by Garnet jerseys. This guard of honor escorted Ralph to touchdown territory. Miner Vail got orders to go in and make the point or else go out for girl's hockey. Miss Dulin lost a rangy forward because Miner came through and split the bars with a perfect placement. This proved finally to be the winning point.

Coatesville came right back and scored after a sixty-yard march. The Garnet line, determined to keep the lead, crashed through to rush the kicker, and his kick was wide.

Coatesville was again on the move in the fourth quarter but a hard tackle by Bartosh and Pollard caused the runner to fumble. Weldon recovered. On the third play, Pollard dropped back to his fifty and threw a long pass to Leslie Hughes on the ten. With two tacklers hanging on, Les fought his way to the goal line and fell over for a score. Vail's kick was a few inches off.

The visitors came right back and scored on a forward pass. The crowd was silent as the Raiders prepared to kick. Again, the T-E line surged in and the Coatesville groans could be heard to Lukens as the kick was blocked.

Downingtown gave T-E a scare in the first period when they drove to the Bulldog seven and then scored on a pass from Jack Helm to Joe Sciarretta. Aroused by the Whippet score, Tredyffrin-Easttown fought back in a 50-yard drive, which culminated with Harry Mitchell cracking across from the one. Minor Vail place-kicked the extra point to give the invaders a 7-6 halftime edge.

The Bulldogs came out strong in the third quarter and marched 40 yards to the Whippet three. From that point, Leonard Zonetti crashed through to score. Again Vail converted.

Bob Pollard, Tredyffrin-Easttown High School's great backfield star, was named the outstanding football player in any local high school, as the result of a flood of votes from the Upper Main Line school. Pollard has performed brilliantly for the Bulldogs during the past three seasons, received a
