

Patriots' Defense stifles Conestoga

Led by an explosive running attack and an unyielding defense, Great Valley handily defeated Conestoga 20-6 in a non-league football game Saturday night at Valley Stadium.

It was the first time the Patriots have won the opening game of their season since 1978.

The only lapse the Patriot defense suffered all night occurred in the second quarter. The Pats allowed

Conestoga's Dave Szafranski to connect with Dale Alleyne on a 39-yard pass play, which put the ball on the Great Valley 3-yard line. On the next play, Dennis Knight carried the ball into the end zone, and the Pioneers led 6-0, Dave Marshall's extra point attempt failed.

"We thought at the beginning of the game, after we scored, we had things under control," said losing coach Harry Gicking.

Although six minutes of the third quarter remained as well as the entire fourth period after the final Patriot score, Conestoga was not able to generate any offense.

Top-ranked Green Raiders rough up Pioneers

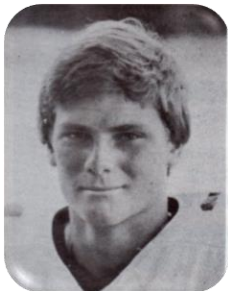

In the first half, the Pioneer defense had limited the Raiders to 84 yards rushing, 44-yards passing, and just seven points. Additionally, Conestoga gridders had put points of their own on the Phil Marion Field scoreboard via a 5-yard TD run by Dennis Knight with just 51 seconds remaining in the half.

"We played much better in this game than we have all season," said Gicking. "Our players have nothing to be ashamed of. Ridley's a very strong team with a lot of quality people. The final score doesn't indicate how well our kids played."

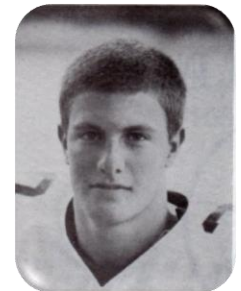

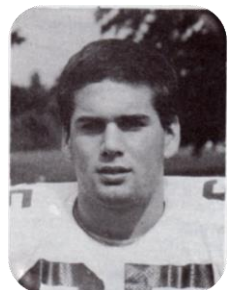

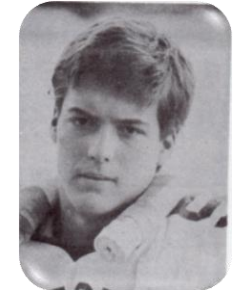

21-6 Victory

Conestoga chalks up its First Win

An extraordinary defensive effort combined with a never-say-die offense gave Conestoga a reprieve from its 0-3 season start, as the Pioneers stopped Springfield 21-6 in a Saturday night Central League contest.

"This was a must win," said an elated Pioneer coach, Harry Gicking, as his charges trotted off the playing field savoring their first victory.

"It's true we lost three games to powerful teams, and I guess you might call those losses character building," Gicking reflected. "But still I had to worry that losing three straight might really leave these kids down. Tonight, they showed me they have the ability to bounce back. I'm especially proud of our defense in not allowing any scoring. (The only Springfield touchdown came on an interception.)"

For a while it appeared that the Conestoga offense might not be able to match the squad's defensive effort, as neither the Pioneers nor the Cougars could mount anything resembling an offense in the first period.

A fumble recovery deep in Cougar territory gave the Pioneers the break they needed, and Todd Madison's 14-yard touchdown romp on a third and three situation in the opening moments of the second quarter supplied them with offensive impetus.

Madison gave the Pioneers another lift with only 44 seconds left in the period, and Conestoga was faced with a third and one-half situation on the Cougar 45.

Madison not only picked up the needed half yard, but rumbled all the way to the end zone, upping the Conestoga lead to 13-0. Dave Marshall's second successful point after boot gave the home squad a 14-0 halftime edge.

The final Conestoga score was set up by Dave Szafranski's 45-yard punt return, giving the Pioneers first and goal at the Cougar 10. It took Dennis Knight three attempts, and a high leap over the pile of linemen stacked up on the goal-line for the Pioneers' last tally at the 6:31 mark of the fourth quarter.

Game statistics give an indication of the Pioneers' dominance. They allowed only 18 net yards on the ground and held quarterback Mike Stumpf to a 4-19 performance with only 43 yards via the air route.

The relentless Pioneers' pass rush coupled with their defensive backs' sticking like glue to the Cougar receivers totally foiled Springfield's hopes of chalking up its first Central League victory.

Defense sparks Conestoga Victory

Disguised as a bright moon shining, good fortune smiled on the Conestoga football team Saturday night, allowing the Pioneers to come away with a hard-fought 14-7 Central League win over the winless-but-not-lifeless Royals of Upper Darby.

It would be no exaggeration at all to say that the Conestoga defense was the reason the Pioneers won the game Saturday night. In the first half, it was all that anyone could ask for.

In the first quarter, the Pioneers completely stymied the Upper Darby offense. They did not allow the Royals to complete a pass and intercepted one of the two Upper Darby passes thrown in the first quarter. They did not surrender a single first down to Upper Darby, and they held the Royals to just four yards on seven carries.

Things were much the same in the second quarter. The Royals got a pair of first downs, but one was via a penalty. They completed one pass in five attempts for eight yards, and rushed for 14 yards on 11 carries. They were only in Conestoga territory for one offensive play the entire first half.

The Conestoga offense chipped in with a solo touchdown in the first half. The Pioneers got their lone pre-intermission score at 7:02 of the first period when Todd "Bubba" Madison broke over right tackle, barreled over a few defenders and then flew untouched down the right sideline for a 48-yard touchdown. Dave Marshall's PAT kick missed the mark, and the score remained 6-0.

"Todd Madison did a good job of running the ball for us tonight," commented his coach Harry Gicking. "His touchdown play was an especially nice run."

In the second half, the Upper Darby offense really put the Conestoga defense to the test. The first test came on the Pioneers' first possession of the half.

Facing a third-and-14 on their own 9-yard line, the Pioneers opted to try a quick kick. Conestoga punter, Dave Szafranski squibbed the kick, and the Royals had a first-and-goal on the Pioneers' 7 yard line.

The Conestoga defense held the Royals in four plays, and the Pioneer offense parried by fumbling the ball back to the Royals on the punt return. On the very next play after the fumble, Upper Darby quarterback Jim Thompson went for the big one and aired the ball out. Szafranski stepped in, picked off the pass, and returned it 62 yards for the game winning touchdown. Steve Downey passed to Eric Krohn on the conversion, and the Pioneers were back on top 14-7.



"Dave made an error with the fumble, but he certainly made up for it," remarked Gicking. "We still need to score more points, but I was very pleased with the way our defense executed. Eric Krohn played an excellent game."

Krohn, a 6-foot-3, 235-pound senior, plays tight end on offense, and then defensive tackle when the other team has the ball. Last night, he provided key blocks on offense, and defensively he registered six tackles and four sacks. Two of the sacks were crucial ones that stopped the Royals on their potentially game-winning drive in the game's closing stages.

"This and the Ridley game were my two best games defensively," said Krohn, who is nicknamed "Moose." "I enjoy playing both ways on offense, I usually catch two or three passes a game, but tonight I was mostly on blocking assignments, and I didn't have any catches. Our defense did a good job tonight, and it seems that we're really coming together as a team now."

Win 3-0

Krohn Field Goal lifts Conestoga by Lower Merion

Touchdowns were a high-priced commodity at Teamer Field in Berwyn last night when the football teams from Lower Merion and Conestoga faced off in a key Central League contest.

As a matter of fact, touchdowns were so dear that neither the Aces nor the host Pioneers could afford one.



The Pioneers were able to avoid a scoreless tie thanks to a 37-yard line-drive field goal by Eric Krohn midway through the final period. Krohn's three-pointer held up, and Conestoga was able to escape with a narrow 3-0 win.

"A win is a win," said a pleased Harry Gicking, the Pioneers coach.

"In the first part of the season we were just looking to win a football game, but we were going against some very tough competition. Now we've won three games in a row and we're moving along."

"Tonight's game was really a back-and-forth kind of thing," Gicking continued. "The defenses dominated the game. We were very pleased with the game our defense played, especially because Lower Merion has a good offense."

The Aces were held in check by the Conestoga defense almost the entire game. Lower Merion mounted one drive in the first quarter in which the Aces got three first downs and posed their only scoring threat. But the Pioneers refused to let them in the end zone.

In the third quarter, neither team completed a pass and neither team logged a first down.

By the time the fourth quarter rolled around it appeared that if there were to be a winner in the game one of the teams would have to be the recipient of a break. The break came the Pioneers' way when the Aces dropped back to punt only to have the snap sail over punter's head.

The Pioneers took over possession at the Aces' 20-yard line. Three plays later, the Conestoga offense was still at the 20. The weight then fell on Krohn's shoulders.

The kick was an awkward line-drive shot that just cleared the bar. On their next possession, the Pioneers ate up a large chunk of the fourth quarter, sustaining an 11-play, time-consuming drive by letting Madison run right at the Aces.

"Todd had a good rushing night," said Gicking. "He ran as hard tonight as he ever has. Near the end of the game, we switched him to tailback to get him the ball more. We're really pleased with his speed out in the open, and with his size (6-foot, 225-pounds), we're really glad he's not on the other team."

"I just try to read my blocks and break the run," said Madison, who lists West Virginia, Pitt, Maryland, Temple, and Florida State as potential schools for next year. "I've been clocked 4.8 in the 40, but I think I've gotten quicker since the season started."

On the origin of his nickname "Bubba" Madison remarked. "That's just the name the coaches call me. I don't know where it came from. My teammates call me "Chocolate Thunder," and I like it better."

Strath Haven tops Conestoga 13-3

"In high school football, big plays are where it is," stated Strath Haven coach Jim Connor as his Panthers used a 98-yard run by sophomore halfback Monty Rice and a 69-yard kickoff return by Fox Williams to set up their winning margin in toppling Conestoga 13-3 at Teamer Field last night.

The Central League contest was also filled with ironies and unusual twists. Both teams gained over 200 yards, and yet the game was essentially a battle of defenses.



Pioneer quarterback Jamie Kerr completed 11 passes for 170 yards, but none resulted in scoring. The Pioneers, in fact, had three players at the quarterback slot during the game and four different backs tossed passes.

THE PIONEERS' three-pointer got the scoring underway as Eric Krohn knocked a 40-yarder through the uprights at the 3:50 mark of the first period.

The 3-0 lead held through the middle of the second period, as Conestoga was able to continually thwart every Panthers' attempt to get a sustained drive going.

Giveaways hurt the Pioneers' chances of getting any kind of sustained offense going in the second half, losing three fumbles and having two errant passes picked off. The Pioneers did get some bounces going their way, however, especially with Krohn recovering a fumble as well as picking off an errant Panther pass.

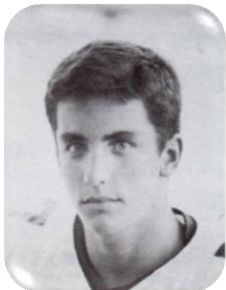
THE PIONEERS made one last charge getting the ball down to the Panther 1-yardline when the clock ran out.

Pioneer coach Harry Gicking felt his defense had done a "great job", (a thought echoed by Panther coach Connor), but Gicking offered that. "If we're going to win any more games, we have to get the offense going."

Actually, it was the lack of a ground game that killed the Pioneers, who netted only 37 rushing yards.

"We are really hurting offensively with Todd out," Gicking related, referring to his star fullback Todd Madison, who was injured last week, and who has amassed over 400 yards so far this season on the ground.

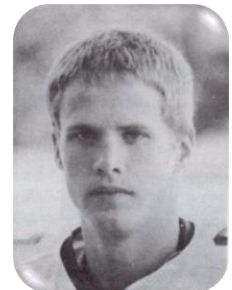

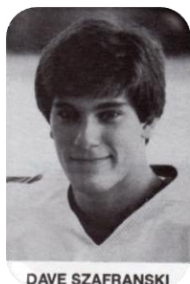

Szafranski helps lift Conestoga

Conestoga football coach Harry Gicking seems to have finally succeeded in his season long quest to field a reliable starting quarterback.

Saturday morning in the Pioneers Central League win over host Penncrest, senior Dave Szafranski stepped in and reclaimed the quarterback position. He completed five of seven passes, effectively guiding the Conestoga gridders to their fourth win in six league games.

On the Pioneers sixth possession, their last of the first half, Szafranski took over in place of Kerr. His first pass was a 45-yard completion to Dale Alleyne. When halftime intermission arrived both teams were still scoreless.

THE CONESTOGA defense was good in the first half and got better in the second.

The Pioneers first drive of the second half was aborted when the Conestoga quarterback fumbled the ball away. On their next possession, they moved from the Conestoga 34 to the Penncrest 12 on nine plays. On the 10th, Szafranski ran the ball and was headed for an apparent TD, but coughed up the ball just as he was about to cross the goal line.

Fortunately for the Pioneers the ball bounced into the end zone, and Dennis Knight pounced on it for Conestoga's first touchdown. The key play in the drive came midway through when the Lions had Szafranski cornered deep behind the line of scrimmage.

Just when a sack seemed inescapable, Szafranski scrambled away and took off for a 35-yard gain and a first down.

"Their pass rusher was coming in on me, but I knew I had Tom Alleva blocking for me on the left," said Szafranski. "I just waited for Tom to make his move. He blocked the guy in, and I just stepped around and took off."

"**THAT PLAY BY** Dave Szafranski was critical," said Gicking. "That was the key play of the game. Dave has great ability, and he was running the option really well today. Plus, our offensive line was blocking very well."

When the Pioneers got the ball again after the touchdown, they took it down and scored again. This time the scoring play, a 37-yard field goal came from Eric Krohn.

Conestoga had the ball only one more time in the second half. The scoring drive was capped with an exciting 35-yard touchdown run by Dennis Knight.

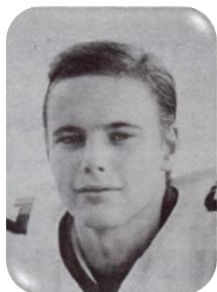
"Defensively, we put a lot of pressure on them the whole game," he continued. "Penncrest is a physical team, and you have to be at your best to beat them. Today we had a combination of a good pass rush and good secondary play, and that makes it tough for opponents to get anything going against us."

The teams played through a scoreless third quarter and then the Fords moved into the lead for good with a second touchdown at the beginning of the final period.

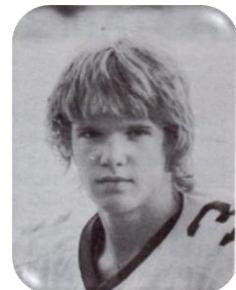

The Conestoga offense was having a fairly decent game of its own. The Pioneers rushed for 264 yards, passed for 188 yards, and stayed in the game until the very end.

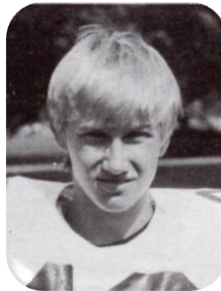
