




In addition to Barajas and Whitaker, other lettermen on the Pioneer line are Bill Leary at right guard, Jimmy White a left guard and All Ches-Mont

Freed was hit hard by a host of Conshy defenders on the threeyard-line. The ball squirted out of his grasp into the end zone where Bob 'Mex' Barajas, Berwyn end, took a running leap and landed on the pigskin.

Harry Siravo shook free of the Golden Bears' grasping hands midway through the third quarter and drove 40 yards for his first touchdown of the season. Tackle Dom DiAntonio took two would-be defenders out of Siravo's way in one swoop. A perfect placement kick by White put the Pioneers in a 20-0 lead.

Conshohocken kept the ball in Conestoga territory through most of the fourth period, but they could not score on a running play. Finally with less than two minutes to play, they scored for the only Conshohocken TD.

Jim Lledo and Jim White ripped the Bears' offensive attack again and again. Harry "The Horse" Siravo played his most outstanding game so far. Byrd took quick advantage of the holes opened by his blockers and drove a few extra feet when he was hit.



# QB Al Freed Stars in 19-6 Win As Conestoga Records 4th Victory

Alan Freed was in great pitching form as Conestoga High racked up its fourth victory of the campaign compared to one defeat in socking Plymouth-Whitemarsh High 19-6 on Saturday in the final of a two-year series. Freed ran for two touchdowns on gallops of 16 and two yards and the tall quarterback passed 31 yards to end Matt Alston for the third tally

Tackle Sel Whitaker and end Bob 'Mex' Barajas were standouts on defense for the Pioneers of Bill Paolantonio. Also outstanding on offense was Harry Siravo's running.



## Siravo's Runs Swamp Pottstown, 25-0

Conestoga High plowed through heavy rains and a sea of mud, football's greatest equalizers, to swamp Pottstown High, 25-0, on Saturday night before a mere 150 fans (excluding players) to set the scene for a battle of the unbeaten among the Ches-Mont League teams this Friday night against Downingtown. Conestoga splashed to its fourth straight league victory while posting its fifth win.

Pottstown put up a stiff fight in the first half of a battle which featured some brilliant long distance running by Conestoga halfback Harry Siravo who scored two touchdowns. Conestoga could score but one official touchdown in the first half. Near the end of the first period, Siravo galloped 67 yards into pay dirt, but the play was called back when officials detected clipping on the Pottstown 38. Siravo, nevertheless, got credit for a 33-yard run.

Conestoga finally scored midway through the second period when the Pottstown punter got an overthe-head center and a flock of muddy Conestoga players pounced on the pigskin at the Pottstown 13. Nine plays later, quarterback Alan Freed plunged two yards for the touchdown. Pottstown got to Conestoga's 16 in the first period, but the Pioneers' line held. Score 6-0

After running back the opening kickoff 29 yards in the third period, QB Freed engineered Conestoga to its second touchdown pronto. Fullback Eddie Byrd ran the ball on nine of the ten plays and bolted 12 yards through right tackle for the payoff. On the TD play, Byrd was hit four times but Pottstown tacklers could not get a firm footing and the bull-necked fullback kept right on going. Jim White kicked the extra point. Score 13-0

A Pottstown fumble set up Conestoga's next touchdown just inside the third period. A Trojan halfback fumbled a pass from center after being hit by 230-pound tackle Sel Whitaker and 180-pound center Tony Yelovich, both of whom played standout defensive ball. The ball was recovered by Conestoga on the Pottstown six-yard line, and on the next play halfback Siravo turned his right end for the touchdown. Score 19-0

With about a minute to go in the game, Siravo broke through right tackle and flashed 73 yards for a touchdown. This play came after Conestoga drove from its 29 to midfield only to be set back to the 27 on a personal foul. Score 25-0

In addition to Siravo's touchdown recall there were two other Conestoga scores nullified by penalties. One was a 31-yard run by Jim Mitchell which was killed by backfield in motion. The other was a two-yard plunge by Freed, nullified by off sides, but he duplicated the feat three plays later.

Siravo was the game's outstanding runner, piling up 141 net yards. Byrd was the Pioneers' workhorse carrying the ball 21 times for a net gain of seven yards.

# Downingtown Holds Conestoga To 0-0 Tie

4,000 Witness Punting Duel, Tight Line Play in Rain; Pioneers Out-Gain Whippets By RED HAMER

"Have fish. Will travel." Chances are Conestoga High coach Bill Paolantonio and Downingtown mentor Ray DiSerafino would have used such a human fish if they had one last night. But they didn't and their teams, unbeaten in the Ches-Mont League, came up with nothing but zeros at mud-slick Teamer Field, Berwyn.

A capacity crowd of nearly 4,000, throwing cheers from one side of the field to the other throughout the dramatic defensive duel, saw the two opposing quarterbacks boom punts that have rarely been witnessed in recent county scholastic football

#### Freed Kick Carries 73

Downingtown quarterback White booted a punt 67 yards in the early moments of play. Conestoga's Alan Freed got one off that travelled 73 yards from the line of scrimmage to the Downingtown one-yard line. Each punter kicked a half-dozen times. White averaged 41.5 yards a boot while Freed's average came out to 44.5

The line play of both clubs was superb. It was hardly a night for passing because of the intermittent heavy showers. Besides Conestoga rushed Downingtown's vaunted passer White so effectively that he hardly felt like throwing the ball. He launched only four and completed one for 15 yards. And so the contest developed into one of rushing and punting.

#### **Fumble Sets Up Drive**

While the punters were having their night, the first break developed near the end of the first period when a Downingtown handoff in the backfield squirted air-ward and was grounded by Conestoga's 6-5, 230-pound tackle Sel Whitaker on the Whippet 39. An off-sides penalty put the ball on the 34. Harry Siravo, the outstanding runner on the field with a net gain of 71 yards, ripped to the 30. His running chum, Eddie Byrd, sliced to the 21 for a first down. After Siravo managed to buck to the 18, Downingtown held and took over.

Towards the middle of the second period Conestoga went knocking again by putting the ball in play at the Whippet 45 after Byrd ran a punt back. Byrd carried once, and Siravo twice to the Downingtown 35 and then face with a fourth down and one to go situation, Freed bulled through the center on a keeper to the Whippet 26 for a first down.

Freed, Byrd and Siravo each carried once. With the ball now resting on the Whippet 19 and with three yards to go for a first down, Siravo tried right guard, slipped while charging through the hole, and missed a first down by 18 inches.

Downingtown mounted an attack, but Jimmy Lledo knocked down a White pass, and the Whippets punted. Conestoga advanced the ball to its 27, and from this point Freed laid into his 73-yard boot. Conestoga guard Jimmy White downed the ball on the Downingtown one-yard line. Conestoga held, and Downingtown punted to the 38-yard line.

#### **Most Serious Threat**

It was from this spot that Conestoga constructed the most serious threat of the ball game. Siravo dashed seven and then two yards to the 29. Byrd found daylight through right guard to the 21 for a first down. Then faced with a fourth down on the 15, Siravo fled through right guard to the 11 for another first down. Siravo carried to the nine but when Freed made two more on the next play, Conestoga was charged with a personal foul and the ball went back to the 24.

Freed ran the bootleg to the 14, and Siravo churned through the middle to the nine. Faced with a fourth and seven, Siravo was sent through right tackle, but he was racked up at the eight to kill the threat.

When the Whippets took over, Lledo saved the day again when he knocked down another pass in the end zone. 'Mex' Barajas and Tony Yelovich hit QB White on the next play for a one yard loss, and Conestoga held.

Defensive stars for Conestoga in this first tie in the 32-game series were guards Jimmy White and Bill Leary, tackles Sel Whitaker and Walt Pierce, center Tony Yelovich, end 'Mex' Barajas and linebacker Jimmy Lledo.

# **Conestoga Stays in Running For Ches-Mont League Title**

#### Wallop Phoenixville 31-6; Jim White, Sel Whitaker Outstanding on Line By RED HAMER

Conestoga High's powerful football team dispelled mental letdown fears on the part of head coach Bill Paolantonio and ground out a 31-6 Ches-Mont League victory over Phoenixville at Washington Field, Phoenixville, Saturday before 3,000 fans.

The Pioneers looked very impressive in rolling to their fifth circuit triumph by scoring in all four periods and wiping the Phantoms out of a mathematical chance of tying for the title. Conestoga, meanwhile, stayed very much in the running.

Conestoga piled up 352 net yards on the running of halfback Eddie Byrd and halfback Harry Siravo and fullback Jimmy Lledo (who streaked 77 yards for one score) and the passing of quarterback Alan Freed

#### White, Whitaker Excel

But the blocking and tackling of watch-charm guard Jimmy White and 6-5, 230-pound tackle Sel Whitaker stole the show. These two rugged competitors boosted their chances for All Ches-Mont honors and figured heavily in holding the Phantoms to a minus 28 yards on the ground.

Conestoga's five touchdowns were scored by as many players. Siravo plunged one-yard for the first score. Byrd turned an end-run eight yards for another, Freed tallied on a one-yard keeper, Lledo raced 77 yards and end Mex Barajas climaxed things by catching a 20-yard pass thrown by Freed.

In the first period the Pioneers rolled 57 yards in 12 plays with Byrd personally picking up 35 of those yards all on the ground. Siravo plowed four yards to the 10 for a first down, and Byrd went through right guard to the six. Siravo then knifed to the one-foot line and on third down shot through the middle for the opening score.

#### **Bvrd Races 60**

Three minutes and 20 seconds later Conestoga scored again. After a punt rolled dead at the Pioneer 20, Byrd took off on first down and raced 60 yards down the right sidelines to the Phoenixville 20. End Joe Parella threw a key block en route, and Byrd did a nifty piece of hurdling to get by three fallen tacklers in the early going. From the 20, Siravo knifed through guard to the 10 for another first down.

Pete Thorell got two yards and then Byrd took off again around his right end for the touchdown behind a nifty block by Jimmy White. Thorell stopped a Phantom threat late in the second period by intercepting a pass on his 33.

#### **Phantoms Threaten**

On a 78-yard play, the Phantom QB passed from his 14 to his 35. The receiver caught the ball and scurried all the way to the Conestoga eight 1957 Conestoga Football Team Highlights

where Byrd tackled him from behind. On the next play, Whitaker tackled the quarterback for a 12-yard loss followed by a 10-yard loss as time ran out in the half.

Conestoga opened the second half by marching 62 yards for a touchdown on 12 plays. The big gainers en route were 9- and 24-yard runs by Siravo and a 13-yard pass from Freed to Thorell. Freed, after plowing to the one for a first down, needed only one play to add the final touch for an 18-0 lead.

#### Lledo Races 77

Conestoga used only two plays in travelling 83 yards for the second score of the third period. After a Phoenixville punt, Byrd chopped through guard to his 23. Lledo carried the ball for the first time on the next play and made a big hit. He fled through left guard and was in the clear at midfield. White delayed a Phantom tackler at the Phoenixville 25, and Lledo went over the final stripe. White kicked the extra point.

Midway through the fourth quarter, Conestoga made it 31-0, reeling off only five plays in the 42-yard march. Lledo returned a Phantom punt 13 yards to the Phantom 42. Siravo blasted to the 33. A Freed pass went incomplete, and then Byrd turned right end for a first down at the 27. 



Some 1,000 fans, armed with umbrellas, heavy boots blankets had just settled down following the opening kickoff when Siravo, the best-running "mudder" on the field, tore off tackle on his long touchdown run. S-F kicked off to Alan Freed who ran the ball from his 10 to the 37. On the game's first scrimmage play, rampaged off left tackle, twisted away from a tackler at midfield and plodded down the sidelines for a touchdown. End Joe Parella threw a nifty open-field block on the 12.


### **Conestoga Hosts West Chester In Toss-Up Test**

#### 52<sup>nd</sup> Renewal to Decide Ches-Mont Champion Tomorrow

Thursday morning's Ches-Mont League battle between West Chester and Conestoga High Schools at Teamer Field, Berwyn, looms as a virtual duplicate of the 1956 Turkey Day game. A title hinges on the outcome. An overflow crowd is expected.

Coach Bill Paolantonio is back for his third stab at a title and his other assistant, Bob Fitzgerald, is also on the job. Paolantonio's 1955 team won the title. Up to now his teams have won 23, lost only four and tied two.

The tremendous rushing power of Conestoga halfback Harry Siravo through the middle and off tackle, and the flying end runs of his sidekick Eddie Byrd have been the Pioneers' bread and butter all season.



Quarterback Alan Freed also does a great job in mixing up his plays and running the bootleg occasionally. In fact both quarterbacks are expected to run this play once or twice during the game.

Mex Barajas, only 5-7 at end, has developed into a capable pass catcher for Conestoga. He gets downfield fast and often out-foxes the enemy secondary. Jimmy Lledo has good speed at fullback to go all the way. He raced 76 yards into pay dirt against Phoenixville.

The Pioneers have not used the forward pass too much except against non-league opponent Plymouth-Whitemarsh when Freed connected on six of 13 passes for 135 yards. The Pioneers are good at defending against aerials, however.


Only four touchdowns have been scored against Conestoga in seven league games, two on passing. The Pioneers boast the best defensive unit in the league.

# Conestoga, Downingtown Share Ches-Mont Title

Yelovich Stirs Pioneers on 95-Yard Run To Beat WC 25-13 Before 6,500 By RED HAMER (Local News Sports Editor) November 29, 1957

Conestoga High defeated West Chester 25-13 yesterday morning to share in the Ches-Mont League championship in one of the real Thanksgiving Day classics in this 52-year old football series dating back to 1903. Conestoga's coach Bill Paolantonio saw his Pioneers win their second title under his outstanding leadership rein of three seasons and finish the regular season with an 8-1-1 record.

It was a wild and woolly ball game played in perfect football weather at Teamer Field, Berwyn, before 6,500 fans, the largest throng ever to see football on the seven-year-old gridiron.

The entire complexion of the ball game turned completely in Conestoga's favor with West Chester leading 7-6 in the third period.

#### Yelovich Streaks 95

West Chester, soon after their TD, went knocking again and came up with a first down on the one-yard line. WC QB tried his right side, fumbled on the five and Pioneer center Tony Yelovich scooped up the pigskins and dashed 95 yards right up the sidelines behind eight blockers for a touchdown to put Conestoga ahead, 13-7. Then guard Jimmy White, in placement formation, passed to his end Mex Barajas for the extra point deep in the corner of the end zone.

West Chester ripped back, and scored on an eight-yard pass to tie the game 13-13. Conestoga capitalized on a bad pass from center and chugged 38 yards for the lead touchdown and drove 34 yards for the clincher when another daring fourth down pass by West Chester backfired. Both winning scores came in the fourth period.

#### **Final Score**

Jimmy Lledo, Pioneer fullback, who played a standout game on defense, swept six yards around end on a reverse and then Eddie Byrd put on a great burst of speed around his right end on the next carry for a 34-yard touchdown run. Left guard Bill Leary pulled out and made the key block.


