East edges 'Stoga

WEST GOSHEN—Billed as a clash between a golden armed gun slinging quarterback and a swift, elusive tailback. Friday's season opening high school football battle pitting Conestoga against West Chester East took on a totally different storyline. With the visiting Pioneers determined to contain the passing of East star Matt Schaub, and the Vikings committed to stopping Conestoga's splendid junior runner Marquis Weeks, much of Friday's non-league confrontation did not focus on these two stars.

But it's very difficult to keep great players down for an entire game. Weeks finally broke loss for a second half TD run to give the Pioneers a brief lead, and then Schaub responded immediately by engineering an 85-yard scoring march midway through the final quarter to give the Vikings an eyebrow-raising 25-19 triumph.

"Both defenses tried to take away the other teams' top player, and both were pretty successful," Conestoga head coach Tim Donovan said. "I thought we did a real nice job against Schaub. I didn't think we'd be able to shut him down like that. But he did have one real big play that proved to be the difference."

In a surprising twist, East wound up outgaining Conestoga on the ground by a wide margin, while the Pioneers' less heralded passing attack outperformed Schaub and the Vikings. Weeks needed 21 carries to grind out 56 yards, but 'Stoga quarterback Gavin McCrory passed 240 yards and two TD's.

"Our defense did well to contain Weeks," East head coach Joe Carroll said. "We really emphasized that all week because he's a great running back. But (McCrory) threw a little better than we thought he would."

"The turnovers in the first quarter really killed us," Donovan said, who watched as his team turned the ball over six times. "Those are hard to overcome, but they are correctable."

The Pioneers started the comeback by putting together a 72-yard scoring drive late in the half. Brad Stanley hauled in a nine-yard pass from McCrory with 20 seconds remaining to make it 17-7 at the half. Conestoga then took the lead with touchdowns on consecutive possessions in the third quarter: a 52-yard strike from McCrory to Dave Brennan, and Weeks' lone scoring run.


"We fought hard and our kids showed a lot of character," Donovan said.

Conestoga bounces back with victory over Radnor

RADNOR—If there is one team that realizes just how big a role turnovers can play in a football game, it's the Pioneers of Conestoga High School. After coughing up the ball six times in its season-opening loss to West Chester East a little over a week ago, Conestoga made a corrected effort to put a stop to bleeding before it had a chance to get out of hand by emphasizing the turnover ratio throughout its week of practice.

All of the extra work paid substantial dividends in Saturday morning's Central League opener, where the Pioneers made a visit to Radnor. Conestoga's defense played a very aggressive game, forcing five turnovers. And the Pioneers offense was quick to capitalize on the miscues, turning three of those into touchdowns in the 28-13 victory.





"We really emphasized all this week winning the plus/minus ratio," said Conestoga head coach Tim Donovan. "And we felt that if we win the plus/minus ratio, we win the game. I thought our defense played phenomenal."

Running back Marquis Weeks also exploded for a big day on the ground, carrying the ball 23 times for 192 yards—150 of which came in the second half—and a touchdown. The hefty rushing total was a bit of vindication for Weeks, who was coming off a 56-yard performance in the season opener.

"My goal was to make up for that last game and make up those yards," said Weeks.

Dave Brennan played the spoiler early in the third quarter, intercepting Grabuski's first pass of the half. Conestoga quarterback Gavin McCrory, who finished

for the score.

5-for-9 for 70 yards, picked up his second touchdown pass of the game when he hooked up with Weeks on a screen pass that turned into a 45-yard play where Weeks broke three tackles and avoided two others with a spectacular spin move.

"I was just trying to get into the end zone," Weeks said of the play that gave the Pioneers a 21-7 lead.

Radnor (0-1, 1-1) cut the

lead to 21-13 with 10:56 left in the fourth on a 2-yard run by Nick Elisio, but Weeks shut the door two series later with a 57-yard touchdown romp that upped the lead to 28-13. Rich Watson opened the scoring for Conestoga with 7:55 remaining in the first quarter when he recovered a fumble and returned it 25 yards

The Pioneers upped the lead to 14-0 following yet another fumble recovery on the very next series when McCrory hit Brennan on a 7-yard scoring play that capped a nine-play, 35-yard drive. "We really needed this game to help get the bad taste out of our mouth from last week," said Weeks.

'Stoga suffers setback

BERWYN—The Cougars scored 19 points in the final nine minutes and 10 seconds to erase a 31-20 deficit and post a 39-31 victory over the Pioneers in Central League football action Friday night. Conestoga (1-1, 1-2) had taken a 31-20 lead with one minute to play in the third quarter on a 20-yard field goal by Matt Hildenbrand.

The Pioneers had jumped off to a 7-0 lead with 10-59 still showing on the clock in the first quarter. Led by Marquis Weeks, who picked up 62-yards on his first three carries, the Pioneers sent Brad Stanley over for the score. Led by Stanley and Weeks, the Pioneers put together an 86-yard drive. Weeks capped it by scoring

with 2:11 left in the first quarter. Conestoga was in the lead again. The Pioneers boosted the advantage to 21-7 as Weeks scored again with 5:46 left in the half.

Buchholz cut the Pioneers' lead to a point, but the extra point was blocked and Conestoga led 21-20. It took the Pioneers less than two minutes to match that score as Weeks ran 51-yards for the score and a 28-20 lead. The fourth quarter was all Springfield.

WALLINGFORD—The Conestoga High School football team got an up-close and personal look at a local juggernaut. Strath Haven put on an impressive offensive show over the first two quarters to quickly defeat Conestoga 35-0.

"That is a real good football team," Conestoga coach Tim Donovan said. "They are as good as any football team that we've ever faced. And as far as Strath Haven goes, that is as good as anybody."

The Pioneers marched the ball to two first downs and ate nearly four minutes of clock as they moved into Strath Haven territory. Penncrest downs Conestoga

BERWYN—The Penncrest High football team used a late surge to top Central League rival Conestoga 32-14 on Friday night. The Pioneers led 14-12 going into the fourth quarter, but Penncrest scored three touchdowns to put the game away.

"The problem was us fumbling and making mistakes at bad times," said Conestoga coach Tim Donovan, whose team fell to 1-4 in the Central League and 1-5 overall. "We made crucial mistakes at crucial

times, like jumping offsides when they had a fourth down."

Penncrest (4-1) keyed on Conestoga running back Marquis Weeks, and limited him to 28 yards on 14 carries. "Defensively, Penncrest beat us," Donovan said. "Their guys were better than our guys." Brad Stanley ran for 120 yards and a touchdown for Conestoga, which picked up only nine first downs—and did not complete a pass.

"They were keying on Marquis, so we tried to get Stanley the ball," said Donovan. "It worked, but we didn't drive. We'd have three or four plays and a penalty, or three or four plays and a fumble."

'Stoga upends Ridley

"Nobody quit," said Weeks. "We beat them on their field, on their (Parent's Appreciation) night. This makes our season." "Coming in we said to put everything else behind us and play the game tonight. We played the way we should've been playing all season."

Weeks gave the Pioneers (2-5 Central, 2-6 overall) a 7-0 lead on a 10-yard second-quarter run, but Ridley



"Our defense and special teams were phenomenal," Conestoga coach Tim Donovan said. "Number 33 (Weeks) played the best game he's played since he's been at


Conestoga. He was a pleasure to watch." The Pioneers forced three fumbles and intercepted four passes.









Rejuvenated Conestoga Rolls past Lower Merion



BERWYN—The Conestoga High School football team brought the confidence boost it picked up in last week's big win at Ridley right back home with it on Friday evening and that wasn't good news for visiting Lower Merion.

After stopping a lengthy drive by Lower Merion (1-7, 2-7), on fourth down at the Pioneer 14-yard line,

Conestoga used a couple of big plays to set up its second touchdown early in the second period. A 33-yard catch by Brennan brought Conestoga down to the Lower Merion 14 and McCrory eventually ran the ball

in from the 1. The two-point conversion made the score 14-0.

An interception by the Pioneers' Miles Bower gave the Conestoga the ball at the Aces' 13 paid off in a 10-yard run by Weeks that increased the lead to 22-0 with 6:39 to play in the first half. Another Lower Merion turnover, this one a fumbled punt, resulted in the Pioneers' final touchdown of the half.

McCrory found Brennan from 7 yards out with 1:14 to go and Brennan ran in his

own two-point conversion as Conestoga went up 30-0, a lead it carried into the break.

"Good teams, when they expect to win, play well and we did," said Donovan. "We played well tonight and I think that gives them confidence." "We had some hard practices (this week)," said Weeks, who led the Pioneers in rushing with 100 yards on 13 carries. "We didn't want to take any teams lightly because we were having turnover troubles. So we just wanted to take care of the ball and score as many points as we could."

Week's second touchdown, a 32-yard run with 8:41 to go in the third quarter, put Conestoga ahead 37-0 and brought on mercy rule. With the clock running continuously for the most part, the Pioneers didn't have to wait long to wrap up the victory, adding one more touchdown in the fourth quarter on a 1-yard run by Tom Wimer.

"We've been close all year long," said Donovan.
"We kind of been struggling, but we've been close. In
the close games, we've wound up on the short side, but
Ridley I think gave us confidence that will hopefully


"When we held on to the ball we really moved," Donovan said. "I wasn't really happy about that, and we also need more consistency from our defense. The effort was there; we just need more consistency."

Defeat Marple Newtown 48-7

BERWYN—In athletics, nothing is more important than finishing strong. Whether it be in an individual game, season, or career, ending things on a high note is definitely of the utmost importance.

For the Conestoga High football team, the only thing that mattered was finishing the 1998 campaign on a roll. And that's exactly what it did on Thanksgiving Day morning when it feasted on arch-rival Marple Newtown's defense in a 48-7 rout.

After starting the season at 1-6, the talented Pioneers reeled of four straight wins to close out the year and finish at 5-6 overall and 4-5 in the Central League. Over those last four games, Conestoga's defense, which was routinely allowing 20 or more points per contest in the early going, surrendered a total of only 35 points.


"I think that this was very important from the standpoint that our senior class is a great bunch of guys and they deserved much better that 1-6 and now they can hold their heads high," Conestoga head coach Tim Donovan said. "And this also gives us a lot of great momentum for next year."

The win was also very big for the Pioneers because it gave them the 11-10-1 lead over Marple Newtown in the all-time Thanksgiving series. "That's a great boost for these kids," said Donovan, who has yet to lose to Marple since taking over the program in 1995.

Junior running back Marquis Weeks was a oneman wrecking crew for Conestoga, as he ran for 239 yards on 19 carries and scored on touchdown runs of 15, 51, 24 and 54 yards. He finished the season with 1,451 yards, well shy of his 2,000-yard sophomore season, but still quite impressive.

"Marquis has had a great year," quarterback Gavin McCrory said. "I mean, 2,000 yards is unbelievable. You look in the NFL and only three guys have ever done it. If it wasn't for Marquis we wouldn't be anywhere."

Weeks and Pioneers' offense were clicking on all




Matt Walters, Captain Senior 6-2, 210 Tight End/ Linebacker

cylinders on Thursday, pounding out 197 total yards in the first half during which they scored touchdowns on four of their five possessions. But it was the passing game that gave Conestoga its first score. The Pioneers used nine straight running plays to get to the Marple 3. And McCrory capped the drive with a 3-yard pass to tight end Matt Walters in the back of the end zone.

After a failed fake punt by Marple (1-8, 2-9) gave Conestoga the ball on the Tiger 31, it took just four plays for the Pioneers to cash in. Weeks scampered 15 yards off right tackle for the 14-0 lead. McCrory's two-yard sneak with 5:48 left until the half moved the lead to 21-0. Weeks finished off his first-half scoring on a spectacular 51-yard run around the left side for the 28-0 lead with 1:22 left.

"Our defense has gained confidence all season long," said McCrory. "They realized that they were good and that they could make the stops." The score was 48-0 before Marple had its most productive drive of the game.

"We knew that we had a really good team when we first came out this season," said McCrory. . . "Things

didn't go very well early and I think that we wanted to prove to everyone that Conestoga has a good football program and that we were a good team this year."
